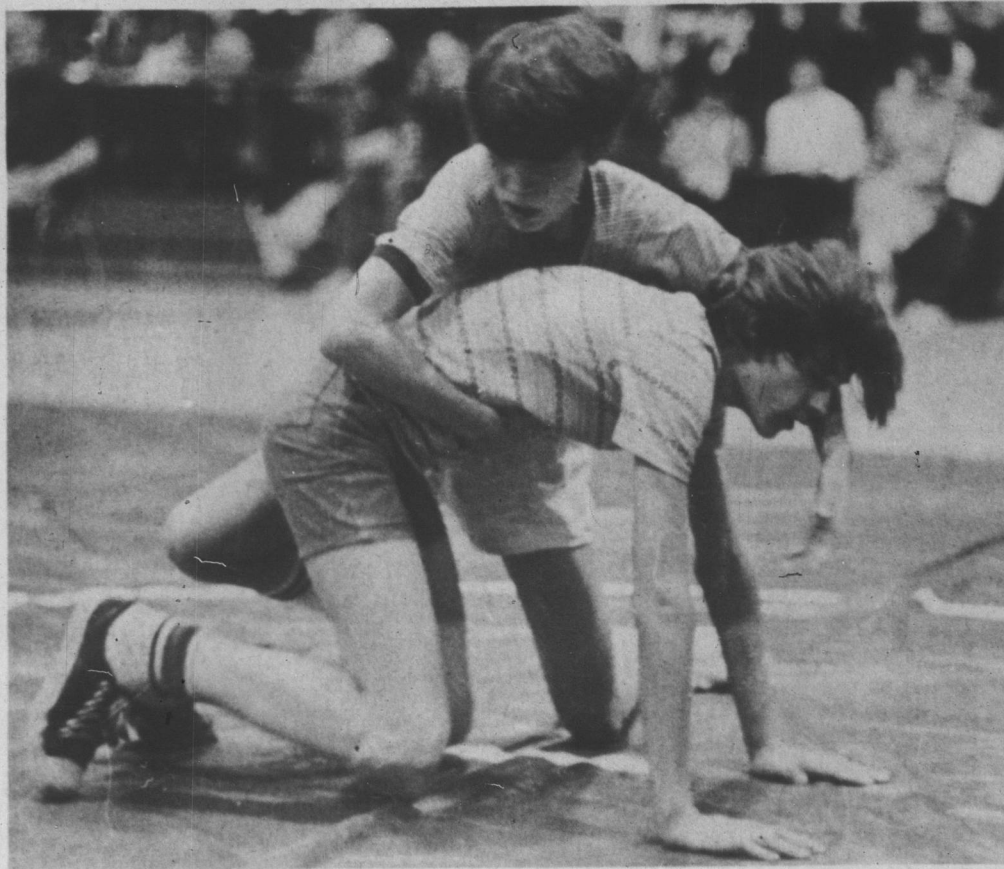

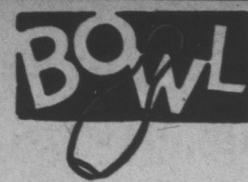

Milford Board To Apply For Federal Sewage Grant

Milford town board president Dr. T. A. Miller signed an application Monday night requesting the town be considered for federal and state sewage grants.

The board has been trying for some time to obtain the necessary papers to file for the government funds. The papers have been received by and filled out by civil and sanitary engineers, Baxter and Woodman, of Crystal Lake, Ill. John Woodman was in attendance at Monday's meeting and stated he needed only to know whether or not the town had land purchased or on option for the project and for a legal description of same.

He also stated he needed a clarification on a letter mailed to the town of Milford and to his firm on February 21 from the state Stream Pollution Control board on the town's standing in an interim-water quality management program.

Woodman explained in many areas towns are pumping their sewage to other facilities instead of building plants of their own. It is his understanding the Indiana Stream Pollution Control board is asking each town to furnish its own plan if it is not a member of a regional plan. Board members said they were unaware of any such group in the area and each town in the county seems to be working on its own plan.

Asked how much time would be involved in studying the interim-water quality management plan and reporting to the state Woodman replied he did not know. Board members decided to have attorney William I. Gerrard do some investigating and contact Baxter and Woodman for further talks.

Long Process

Members of the Milford town board have been trying since 1963, in what has become a long, drawnout process, to establish sewage facilities for the town. At that time Baxter and Woodman were hired and grants were applied for with a federal grant in an amount of \$84,060 being received in May of 1967.

When bids were opened on June 19, 1967 for a sewage treatment plant only one bid was received on the construction of a plant. It amounted to \$325,000, exceeding the engineers estimates by a considerable sum. The bid was not accepted.

Plans were then prepared for a lagoon-type system which is less expensive.

In December of 1967 notice was received of the fact the federal government had withdrawn the grant.

The board began to consider an aerated pond in June of 1968. This would cut the land area necessary from 20 acres for a lagoon to five acres for a pond. Plans have been submitted but as of this date has not been approved by the state boards.

On July 15 of 1971 the board acquired an option on 10 acres of property on the Fred Schori farm northwest of town. If the aerated pond is approved it is to be built there.

Estimated figures for a 1970 report showed costs for an aerated pond were \$202,552, not including improvements to the sewage system.

Woodman stated Monday his firm had up-dated this figure by 20 per cent for purposes of filing the application.

Milford has had a \$1 cumulative fund established for the past several years in order to build a fund to finance the building of sewage facilities. A large part of this money is currently invested and drawing interest which will save tax dollars in years to come.

Adopt Ordinance
Members of the board adopted an ordinance previously ap-

proved by the Economic Development Commission to authorize the acquisition of an industrial facility under the Municipal Economic Development Act of 1965 by the town of Milford, authorizing the leasing of said property to Checkerboard Properties, Inc., authorizing the issuance of \$875,000 industrial development revenue bonds for Ralston Purina to finance the cost of such acquisition and to handle other legal matters necessary to financing the project.

Ralston Purina has agreed to pay all taxes and insurance and to be responsible for the up-keep of the property.

Board members stated the EDC members had asked in their meeting with Ralston Purina officials if they planned to buy grain locally and had received a definite yes with company officials stating that is one reason they wanted to locate in the area.

Street Problem

Four townsmen were present to discuss the problem of 1 1/2 to two blocks of street running from James east to Schaeffer street. The street in question is called East Williams and is gravel. Ronn Herr, Thurston Blackburn, Paul Ganger and Delbert Poe reported the street is not passable during the spring thaws and persons living in the area must park their cars as far away as the Syracuse Enterprise building and walk to their homes. They requested the town do something about the condition of the street.

Street and water commissioner John Martin reported he had tried to help by spreading 80 yards of gravel over the street last week. He agreed something should be done about the condition of the street. Board members Miller and Norman Lovell agreed to meet with Martin early Tuesday morning and look at the street. They stated it would be impossible to do any blacktopping until the ground is completely thawed.

The citizens also asked what could be done about junk cars as they seem to be getting thick once again.

Much Garbage

Before leaving the meeting the taxpayers also asked what could be done about Mexican families in their immediate vicinity who have not been dumping trash regularly. They reported out-buildings and back porches full of garbage and trash and asked what could be done about such situations.

A discussion was held on the possibility of a garbage pick-up

for the town. This is to be investigated further.

Board members suggested the neighbors talk to those who have an excessive amount of trash and request it be moved. They also stated various organizations in town, including the United Mexican-American organization, might be willing to investigate the problem.

Clerk-treasurer Doris Wolferman asked the board to investigate a truck parked in the business district which is overflowing with garbage.

Dr. Miller stated the problems of excessive trash will be investigated. He further stressed the fact all of the culprits are not Mexicans, noting several white persons in town are also guilty of neglecting trash.

Claims were signed at the end of the meeting.
