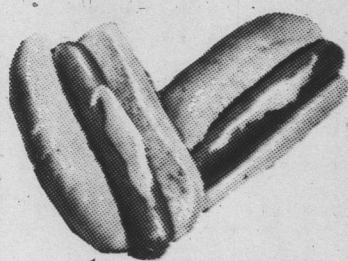

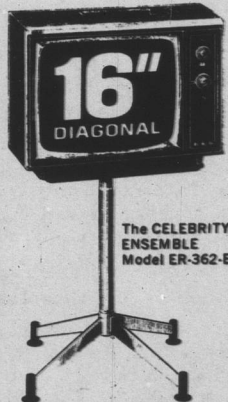

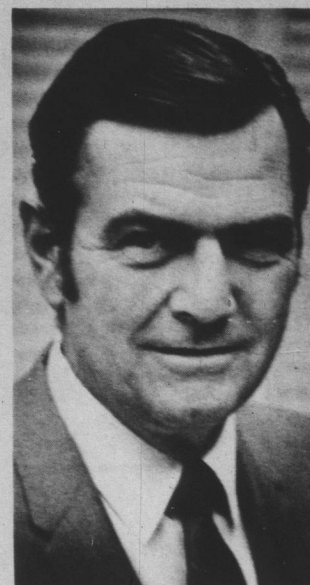

Seven-year-old Gill Cloud, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Cloud of Lexington, Ky., sustained a severe head laceration last Wednesday when the boat in which he was riding rammed into a pier in the channel south of Coy's Bait Shop, Syracuse, breaking two support beams of the pier and making a hole in the hull of the boat.

The 16-foot outboard operated by Gill's father, was towing another fishing boat when the tow line tangled putting the motor throttle in full speed causing the mishap.

The pier was owned by E. D. Hilligoss.

Gill's brother James, 11, and also a passenger in the boat was examined at the office of a local physician.
