Warrant for arrest issued for North Webster police officer

"A warrant for his arrest has come down and he has been notified," explained Kosciusko County Sheriff Ron Robinson. "Hunter will be turning himself in, and a bond will then be set just as it is for anyone else."

North Webster Police Officer Shad Hunter was in an accident on Tuesday, Sept. 29, at 8 p.m. on CR 925E, 75 feet south of CR 500W, near North Webster. He had a blood alcohol of .18 percent at that time. A person is considered intoxicated if the blood alcohol is 10 percent.

According to the county sheriff's department report,

Hunter stated he was east bound on CR 500N and must have been going to fast to make the curve. Because as he went into the curve his vehicle started to slide and he lost control of it and hit the fence and the vehicle rolled over.

Hunter has been with the North Webster force for approximately a year and a half and has graduated from the state police academy. He's a lifetime North Webster resident and was traveling home with his private car at the time of the accident.

Although not seriously injured, Hunter was taken to Kosciusko County Hospital where he was treated for a blow to the head and released.

In addressing the boat races, if

Mrs. Bone questioned the installation of a security light near the boat and commented it was only fair whoever owns the Dixie Boat pay something on this light. Mrs. Nellessen stated the light was installed after the sale of the property.

Other areas of discussion included the two public docks and the work of Charles and

Margaret Lawrence at Fisherman's Cove Resort. "They have taken on themselves collecting a minimal charge if a boat is docked and it is turned over to the town," commented Ziegler.

Ron Erb, of the SkiBees, volunteered the services of the members this winter and other times in assisting the park board, stipulating the need to know in advance so members can be contacted. Badskey commented on the installation of the beach "What we're going to be doing is a waste of money, it is not going to stay . . . that's a lot of money down the drain."

gravel, as county commissioners ruled to maintain the cul-de-sac as originally plotted.

"It's a plotted turn around and the mailman is giving me problems about delivering the mail because it's not kept up as a roadway," explained area homeowner Alan Kramer.

The project is estimated to cost \$1,000 and will be taken care of entirely by the county highway department. It was noted that the cul-de-sac was not put in earlier because area homeowners were not full time residents so the area was used very little.

However, Kramer stated that as of last June he plans to live in the area year round and will need his mail delivered as well as the road plowed during the winter months.

"I talked to the county snow plow drivers before and they explained that they don't plow because there is no place to turn around. But when the mailman complained too — I figured something needed to be done — he (a neighbor) just planted grass in the area and thinks he owns it," Kramer said.

Commissioner Fred Gilliam stated, "As far as I'm concerned it's our right-of-way and we should do with it what we want."

Seek Bids

Commissioners also dealt with drainage problems around St. Louis Lake deciding to start seeking bids for the \$7,982.64 project.

Steve Wentworth, president of the homeowners association explained to commissioners that the project could be handled in thirds, with the county, developer and homeowners each paying for a third. He stated that the project will resolve the problem of drains


