since October 1, 1909, when it was set in regular running order. Had these persons sought employment through private agencies, they would have been required to deposit \$2 each for registration fees, making a total of \$3,000. Had they received work, as they received from free bureau, they would have been compelled to pay the private agency 10 per cent of the first month's wages, or an average \$5, according to statistics concerning the wages of persons provided with work by the free bureau. This would have meant an additional outlay of \$10,500.
