

king an *expose* of the financial condition of the country declared expressly that the debt would be paid in 1832—the very year in which it is now vainly boasted that it is all to be paid by Gen. Jackson! And yet this same Mr. Lane, is of the number of those who are offering incense to the idol, and joining in the sycophantic adulation of the hour, because the debt is to be paid—during my administration."

We copy a proclamation of Gen. Washington, when he was President, as contrasting the policy by him pursued towards the Cherokees, with that of the President that now is, and as a commentary on the savage conduct of the Georgians in hauling the ministers of the Cross with ropes about their necks like dumb-beasts, and thrusting them into prison for asserting and maintaining their own rights and their integrity.

WASHINGTON AND JACKSON.
The partisans of the existing administration, in their insane zeal to glorify and canonize Andrew Jackson, have sacrilegiously compared him to the Father of his Country, and with an impudence approaching to downright blasphemy, dared to call him "the second Washington." What points of resemblance these fanatical idolaters have been able to discover between characters as opposite as the poles, they have never yet condescended to tell—There is one subject at least upon which it would seem there must have been a dissimilarity of sentiment: we allude to the treatment exercised towards the Indian tribes by these two presidents respectively. The following state paper, copied from a journal published nearly forty years ago, will perhaps furnish the worshippers of Andrew Jackson with a new parallel. Let them contrast the conduct of the immortal Washington as it regards the Cherokee nation, with that of his imbecile successor in relation to the same oppressed people—and then bamboozle the nation if they can, into an impression that there exists any thing like the spirit of the former in the guarded brain of the latter.

A PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, I have received authentic information, that certain lawless and wicked persons, of the Western Frontier, in the State of Georgia, had lately invaded, burnt and destroyed a town belonging to the Cherokee nation, although, in amity with the United States; and put to death several Indians of that nation; and whereas such outrageous conduct not only violates the rights of humanity, but also endangers the public peace; and it becomes the honor and good faith of the United States, to pursue all legal means for the punishment of these atrocious offenders; I have therefore thought fit to issue this proclamation, hereby exhorting all the citizens of the United States, and requiring all the officers thereof, according to their respective stations, to use their utmost endeavors to apprehend and bring those offenders to justice. And I do moreover offer a reward of Five Hundred Dollars, for each and every one of the above named persons who shall be so apprehended and brought to justice, and shall be proved to have assumed or exercised any command or authority among the perpetrators of the crimes aforesaid, at the time of committing the same.

In testimony whereof, I have caused the seal of the United States to be affixed to these presents, and, signed the same with my hand. Done at the city of Philadelphia, the twelfth day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety-two, and of the Independence of the United States the seventeenth.

MR. CLAY.

This gentleman, by his judicious, bold, and efficient course in relation to the tariff, is rapidly gaining favor even with those, who have been hitherto among the warmest and most inveterate of his opponents. It seems to be agreed on all hands, that he is doing more towards equalizing the burdens of the country and removing all just causes of discontent, than has been done by General Jackson and his party during the whole period of their power. His energy is breathing newness of life into the nation. Speaking of his remarks upon the reduction of the duty on Alum-Sulf, the Washington correspondent of the N. Y. Evening Journal says:

"During the discussion, the 'Orator of West' displayed his views and future course in relation to the tariff, with his characteristic candor and boldness. The fair and manly avowal of his sentiments extorted from Mr. Clay's most distinguished opponents, the tribute of their admiration. However I may differ with him in regard to certain measures of policy, said one of the gentlemen, I must freely accord to him talents, eloquence, and undoubted patriotism. This, from a Southern, is no common praise; and I verily believe that most of the lofty spirits of Virginia, the Carolinas, &c., entertain similar sentiments."

In reference to the same subject the National Gazette says:

"Mr. Clay 'came out' decidedly and manfully respecting the American System. He eulogized it in warm terms, and stated that, on a suitable occasion, he would detail its advantages. His plan of action is one of compromise, as to particular points, but of unequivocal support of the principle of protection."

Even the Washington Telegraph, which is the organ of the Calhoun party, and on fire

speaks the sentiments of the moderate politicians of the South, is disposed to accord high praise to Mr. Clay. That paper says:

"Mr. Clay, on the occasion referred to, stated that 'he was aware of the necessity of adapting the revenue of the country to the wants of the country, upon the extinction of the public debt, and he was ready to consider the debt as extinguished, and to proceed at once to the formation of the system on which the revenue was hereafter to be based;' and argued that a reduction of the duty would not be followed by a reduction of price. We agree that Mr. Clay has met this question fairly and boldly. We are gratified to hear him assert that for all practical purposes, he considers the national debt as paid, and that he is prepared to proceed at once to the formation of the system upon which the revenue should hereafter be based; and we admit, further, that Mr. Clay's views, in this respect, are greatly to be preferred to the suggestions contained in the report of the Secretary of Treasury, who in his great desire to extinguish the national debt—during the four years of Gen. Jackson's administration—would postpone a reduction of the taxes until after that period. We admit, too, that Mr. Clay fairly states the question upon which mainly depends the propriety of the protecting system."

The resolutions, which Mr. C. introduced into the Senate on the 9th. instant, will do still more to secure to him the admiration and affection of his fellow-citizens.—L. Journal

President Jackson, in answer to a letter lately sent him from Cincinnati, in regard to his health, closes in the following gratuitous strain:—"Contrary to the wishes and prayers of my enemies, I WILL live just so long as God wills that I should live." This, reminds us of the frenchman, who had not yet learned the application of the words *shall* and *will*. Having by some accident fallen overboard, he exclaimed, "I *will* drown, and nobody *shall* help me." A sailor hearing the exclamation, and supposing the frenchman beat on self destruction, immediately answered "Drown and be—*to ye*!"—Ill. Pat.

Sir Walter Scott, attended by his eldest son, Major Scott, of the 15th Hussars, and Miss Scott, his daughter, will sail on board his Majesty's ship *Barham*, from Portsmouth to Malta, and go from thence to Gibraltar and Naples. The worthy baronet intends to make a considerable stay in Italy, and return by the Tyrol, through Germany, where he will visit Hungary, Vienna, Prague, Teplitz, Carlsbad, Munich, Dresden, Leipzig, Stargard, and other principal towns and cities in that empire. Previously to Sir Walter Scott's departure, he finished the "last series" of "Tales of my Landlord," which consist of two Romances, "Count Robert of Paris" and "Castle dangerous."

Maria Louisa Arch-Duchess of Parma, has filled up the post of private favorite, vacant since the decease of Comte de Niepperg. The fortunate gentleman is H. le Baron Mareschal, who by a recent motto *proprio*, is attached to the princess's person, appointed to the dignity of Major Domo of her household and Court, with all the honors and contributions and prerogatives enjoyed by her late Chevalier d'Honneur comte de Niepperg.
