

BOROUGH ORDINANCE.

Whereas it is ascertained beyond doubt that hydrophobia does exist among the dogs, therefore

1. Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Borough of Vincennes, That if any person shall permit any dog or bitch owned by him, or by any member of his or her family to run at large in the Borough of Vincennes, such person, shall forfeit and pay the sum of two dollars as a penalty.

2. Be it further ordained, That it shall be the duty of the Borough Constable, and all others are hereby authorized, to kill all dogs running at large within the Borough of Vincennes.

3. And be it further ordained, That the Borough Constable, and all other persons who shall kill any dog or dogs, shall, on delivering the fresh scalp of said dog to the Borough clerk, and satisfying him that it was killed within the Borough, be entitled to receive orders on the Treasurer for 37 and a half cents for each scalp so delivered.

4. And be it further ordained, That each head of a family who permits any dog to harbor about his or her house, shall be deemed and taken to be the owner of such dog within the purview of this ordinance.

5. Be it further ordained, That if any person or persons shall resist the execution of this ordinance by the Borough Constable or by any person employed by him as an assistant, or any person attempting to kill any dog running at large, such person so resisting, shall be subject to a penalty of three dollars for each offence.

6. And be it further ordained, That any Ordinance of the Borough prohibiting shooting shall be, and the same is hereby repealed, so far as it relates to shooting dogs.
