

OBITUARY.

"Even in life, we are in the midst of death."

DIED—In Petersburg, on Monday the 28th ult. Dr. Peter Cockrell. His death was occasioned by a fall he received from his horse. On the Saturday previous, he was going in company with two other gentlemen to meeting, at Mount Prospect Meeting House. They were riding pretty fast. He attempted to run his horse to the left of a tree that stood in the road. As the horse neared the tree, he made a sudden turn to the right. Dr. Cockrell was unfortunately thrown from his horse, and precipitated violently against the tree. In the fall he received a severe injury in the abdomen which terminated fatally on Monday afternoon. Dr. Cockrell left an amiable and disconsolate widow, and infant daughter to mourn his untimely loss. In Pike county has lost one of her most useful and respected citizens.

He was just entering on the theatre of active business. He had practiced medicine in the country about three years; and by his steady habits and indefatigable attention, he had acquired a very extensive and successful practice. His benevolence and amiable character of disposition, secured the friendship of all those acquainted with him. His death has created a vacuum in the society of this place, that will not be easily filled. It is deeply regretted and will long be remembered.
