

The scandalous falsehood which is implied in the line marked by italics "One of the soldiers of the revolution!" General Jackson must have reckoned largely upon the ignorance and forgetfulness of the American people, when he ventured to sanction this sentence. It is a desperate attempt to gain popularity under a false pretence, which would be punished as swindling in a vagabond who should attempt to gain money by a similar means. Gen. Jackson was not a soldier of the revolution. He was not born till the year 1767, the very year the taxes on tea, paper, &c. were laid, which lighted up the flames of war—three years before the massacre of the British troops in Boston—only six years before the destruction of the tea in Boston harbor—and less than eight years before the battle of Lexington. The armies of the revolution were not made of such stuff as seven-year old babies.

Such an attempt at imposition is unpardonable. This is not the first time it has been made, and exposed, but heretofore the statement has been advanced by underlings, who possibly might plead ignorance in their defence. It is now endorsed by the President himself, who is entitled to no such justification; and it ought not to pass, therefore, without the most pointed and public reprehension.

Some of the Jacksonians pretend to doubt, or rather to deny, that Gen. Jackson sanctions the conduct of the Georgians towards the Cherokee Indians. Let those who doubt upon that subject, read the following letter from Gen. Jackson himself. If they are not then satisfied, language cannot be made plain enough to satisfy them.—*Lexington Observer.*

GEORGIA MISSIONARIES.

The following is the reply of President Jackson to the Board of Missions on the subject of releasing the Missionaries now confined in the Penitentiary of Georgia.

Gentlemen:—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your memorial, stating that certain Missionaries in the state of Georgia have been imprisoned for alleged offences against that state; and requesting my interference in furthering their release.

"In reply, I have to inform you, that the power vested in me, has been placed in my hands for the purpose of seeing the laws of the U. States justly and impartially administered; and not for the purpose of abusing them as I most assuredly should do were I to interpose my authority in the case brought before me in your memorial.

The State of Georgia is governed by its own laws; and if any injustice has been, or is committed there are competent tribunals at which redress can be obtained without any appeal to me. I do not wish to comment upon the causes of the imprisonment of the Missionaries alluded to in the memorial, but I cannot refrain from observing that here, as in most other countries they are, by their inquisitorial zeal, (to give it no harsher name,) too apt to make themselves obnoxious to those among whom they are located.

ANDREW JACKSON.

It is said of one of the British Kings, that it was only necessary for his displeasure to be made known by a wink or a nod, and his faithful attendants would readily find a pretext for putting out of the way any one who might make himself obnoxious to his displeasure by an opposition to his will. Matters have arrived at a state not much short of this in our own country. President Jackson has only to make his will known through his "Official Organ," to insure the harmonious accord of all the pensioned presses. When it is expected that a certain measure is to be adopted by the Administration it is immediately given out through the "Great Globe," and the rest all chime in. If a member of Congress presumes to question the right of the President to do as he pleases, he is immediately pointed out by the old Hero, for Hostage-taking, and his minions soon execute, or attempt to execute, his will. If he is not knocked down, or attempted to be knocked down, by some ruffian bully, his character is assailed by the whole corps of pensioned editors.

In the early part of the present session of Congress the pensioned presses with scarcely a dissent, went to work to pave the way for vetoing any bill for rechartering the United States Bank, that might be passed. It was too soon, they say, to recharter the Bank. Its charter did not expire for some years to come; and besides the people had not yet expressed their wishes on the subject, and if the President vetoed a bill for its re-charter it would be with a view to afford the people an opportunity of expressing their opinion of saying whether they wished it to be rechartered or not. Recently however, the Hero's Organ has been silent, and silence is the word among the echoes. From this we judge the President is in great difficulty, upon the subject, and his organ and his echoes are also in difficulty, trying to speak lest they should not speak the will of their master, and thereby incur his displeasure. So soon as his pleasure is known we may expect to hear from them on the subject. If he signed the bill for re-chartering the bank, it will be right; if he vetoes it, it will be right. The king can do no wrong.
