HISTORY.

Hope revived, and gratitude again bubbled. But as he passed a bridge, he opened his robe, and shook the memorials in the river.

King Phillip, at one period of his reign, declined receiving petitions from his subjects. An old woman urging one upon him, he said he had no time to attend to such applications. "Why, then," said she, "do you continue King?" The reproach struck him, and ever, subsequently, he sat apart two or three days in each week for receiving petitions.

STATE BANKS.

The following sketch from the Bulletin may be useful, though imperfect. The state banks pretend to have aggregate resources of 356 millions or 360 millions of dollars. For such a national bank as a regulator is indispensable.

"The National Intelligencer contains the number and situation of the state banks throughout the U. States, compiled from the returns made in the years 1833 and '34.

From this it appears that the number of state banks is as follows: Alabama 5, Connecticut 21, Georgia 13, Kentucky 3, Louisiana 10, Delaware 7, Massachusetts 102, Maine 29, Maryland 3, Mississippi 3, New Jersey 26, New York 73, North Carolina 3, South Carolina 7, New Hampshire 22, Ohio 20, Pennsylvania 41, Rhode Island 3, Tennessee 3, Virginia 4, Vermont 17, district of Columbia 3, Florida 6, Michigan 5, total 506, with a capital of \$170,123,992 12 paid in Banks Chartered, but not in operation when the above returns were made, 43, with a capital of \$30,200,000. Total banking capital authorized and paid in \$200,323,792 12. Notes in circulation, \$77,723,782 72.—Specie and specie funds on hand, \$17,081,704 65."

Mr. Benton's Knowledge—Historical and Classical.

The following is given in the Gazette of the day, as a part of Col. Benton's speech on a late occasion.

"Would to God, Mr. President, that the branches of the bank were all in the situation in which the tyrant Plato desired the citizens of Rome to be—with but a single neck—that the broad axe of the executive might, at a single blow, sever its head from its body. Now, sir, like the Ali Hyder, whom Sheridan describes as overrunning the provinces of India, it has a hundred heads; and no sooner do we succeed in hewing down one from its corrupt and corrupting trunk, than another springs up in its place. Like the teeth of the idol Dagon slain by Nicodemus—whose harvest was armed men—the golden teeth of the monster bank spring up an army of corrupt senators and abandoned editors."

REMARKS.—Poor Plato figures here for a cruel Roman, Nero or Caligula! The allegorical fable of Cadmus and the dragon's teeth, now is turned into Dagon and Nicodemus. A very fine song, written in Ireland, about Irish volunteers, might have corrected the "learned" senator; for, it contains the following lines:

"The seed thus sown in dragon's teeth
Arose in iron men—
And history's page shall never record
Such volunteers again!"

With respect to the hydra-headed U. S. Bank, these have since created three hydras for one. Such are some of our statements!

THE TWO ARMIES.

The "standing army" of the United States are thus mentioned in the Railway (N. J.) Advocate:

"The army of the United States consists of 6,064 rank and file. The army of office holders, 40,000 rank and file."

C. P. VAN NESS, our Minister to Spain, is a candidate for Congress from the 4th Vermont District. It was stated to the meeting by which he was nominated, that Mr. Van Ness was now on his return. This leaves a vacant Mission and adds \$19,000 more to the "glory and Reform" account, as the out-fit and salary of the new Minister.

The Courier and Enquirer disclaims the sentiment imputed to its Editor by the Niagara Courier, viz: "that the question at the next election would be Bank or no Bank." There is but one sentiment among our friends. They go for the Constitution, leaving Mr. Biddle's great Monster with Van Buren's small ones, to take care of themselves.

Another Seeder from Jacksonism.—The Hon. Francis Pickens, an early supporter of General Jackson, delivered an oration at a Whig Celebration of the Anniversary of our Independence, in which it is said he exposed the political tergiversations of the President and Vice President, with great ability. Mr. Pickens is a man of talent and education, who has, heretofore, received very high encomiums at the hands of the Albany Argus and other papers of that complexion.—Columbia Republic.

Thus situated, he did not come up his full weight to the weighing post, and was declared distanced. We do not dispute this decision, but the point is undoubtedly a delicate one.

While Sciarra, the celebrated rope dancer and balancer, was going through his evolutions at the Walnut street theatre the other night, one of the astonished admirers in the pit suddenly exclaimed, "wonderful! wonderful! the best balancer on earth, but even Sciarra would be puzzled to balance the Post Office accounts."

Query?—The editor of the Nantucket Inquirer, puts the following significant query—"It is death by the law for a petty robbery of the U. States Mail, what should be the penalty of plundering some eight hundred thousand dollars from the Post Office Department?"

He is rewarded.—The brother of the Hon. Mr. Lytle, of Ohio, who threatened to blow up the U. S. Bank if it did not compromise a debt with his father, has just received the office of Paymaster in the U. S. Army.

An Act supplemental to an Act or Acts, incorporating the Borough of Vincennes.

APPROVED JANUARY 27, 1834.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, That after the taking effect of this act, the qualified voters of the Borough of Vincennes, at the annual election in each year, shall in the manner heretofore prescribed by law, elect for each ward two trustees, who shall assemble together and perform such duties as now are required by law.

Sec. 2. That the first section of the act entitled, "an act relative to the Borough of Vincennes," approved January 29, 1834, and so much of any other act or acts now in force authorizing the election of a greater number of trustees than is herein provided, be, and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. That from and after the first day of May next, it shall be the duty of the president and board of trustees of said Borough, to cause to be returned out of all moneys arising from taxes assessed and collected by the authority of the whole amount so collected, which per centage they shall cause to be loaned yearly, and from year to year with the interest accruing thereon, until such time as it shall be sufficient to pay for a good fire engine with all necessary apparatus, and also to erect a house in which to keep the same; and it shall be their duty, when a sufficient sum is accumulated, to procure the same and cause a house to be erected, after which time this section of this act shall cease to be in force.

Sec. 4. This act to be in force from and after its publication in the Vincennes Gazette, a newspaper published in Vincennes.
