WABASH NAVIGATION.

During a recent visit to Cincinnati, we had the pleasure of witnessing the launch of a new boat just built for Capt. Tarkenton (late of the Ship) designed and constructed expressly for the Wabash trade. The "INDIAN" (the new boat) is a beautiful model, constructed of the best materials, by Mr. Gordon, an experienced ship builder of Cincinnati.
