

NEWSPAPER ARRANGEMENT IN PHILADELPHIA.

The following notice appears at the head of the editorial columns of the daily Philadelphia papers, and from the identity of language, we presume it is the result of a combined arrangement among the different daily publishers.

N. Y. Enquirer.

The extensive demand upon the publishers of Newspapers, for the gratuitous use of their columns, for various notices of a public and private nature, renders it necessary that a limit should be placed upon it, in such a way, as that the expense should not be exclusively borne by the party who has the least interest in the matter. The following regulations will be observed by this day's paper from this date:

"Notice of Lawyers' admittance to the bar, and notices of marriages, will be charged fifty cents each, and half the usual price of advertising will be charged for notices of meetings for electioneering purposes, notices of societies, cards of acknowledgement from individuals or companies, and military meetings.

Candidates for office will be charged for every notice or account of public meetings, the full price of advertising."

ADVERTISING.

We were yesterday informed of a circumstance, which admirably illustrates the force of our remarks, two days since, relative to the propriety of the merchants, turning their attention more to advertising. It is stated, as a fact, that a country merchant, a short time ago, came to this city, for the purpose of purchasing a large supply of goods. Arriving at one of our principal Hotels, which has all the city papers lying upon the table in the bar room, the merchant sat down and gave the papers a thorough examination—Having finished his reading, he observed to a bystander, that he regretted to find there were so few goods in town. He continued, I came here to purchase a large stock of goods, but on looking over your papers, I find there are so few in town, that I shall proceed to Louisville, where in the papers, I discover I can get a much better assortment." It was in vain that the bystander attempted to prove, that there was an abundance of goods in the city, and that the wholesale merchants were not much in the habit of advertising. The merchant replied, that if there were many goods in the place, it would certainly be manifested by the advertisements in the daily papers as was the case in all other cities. And remarking further, that as he was in haste, it would be his shortest and best plan to proceed to Louisville at once, where he knew there was a good and ~~abundant~~ assortment.

Cincinnati Intelligencer.
