### MARSHALL.

In memory of the late Chief Justice John Marshall.

THIS is a new town laid off on the National Road, where the Vincennes and Chicago State Road crosses the former on section 13 township 11, north range 12 west, in Clark county, situated 55 miles north of Vincennes, 16 from York, and 10 from Darwin, south of Paris 15, and 50 miles from Danville, and 16 west of Terre-Haute.

It is decidedly the handsomest site for a town between Terre Haute and Vandalia, surrounded by good second rate land, a sufficiency of timber, and the best of stone for building, and it may be truly said, that no point in this section of country has proved more healthy; the confirmed opinion of these on the National Road is, that this selection will be healthy.

The road north and south has been opened by the proprietors from Big creek to the west side of Walnut prairie, and can be travelled with convenience, and when a permanent road shall be made, it will not vary from the present line: Mills are convenient.
