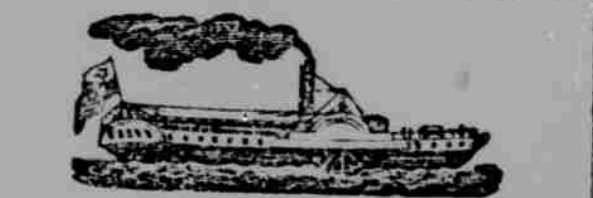
LAND CERTIFICATE.

AN Ordinance relative to the bye laws and Ordinances heretofore in force, and to legalize the acts of the former officers of the Borough of Vincennes.
BE it ordained by the President & Trustees of the Borough of Vincennes, that all the bye laws and Ordinances which were deemed in force in the Borough of Vincennes, on the 16th day of February 1835, be, and the same are hereby declared to be in full force and operation, and also all the official acts and proceedings of those persons who on the 16th day of February 1835 claimed to be, and acted as officers of the Borough of Vincennes, so far as the said acts and proceedings were in pursuance of the bye laws and Ordinances of the said Borough on said day deemed to be in force, are hereby legalized, and declared to be valid, and also that all money and effects or property whatsoever of the said Borough which have come to the hands, or possession of any person or persons acting as a Borough officer before or since the said 16th day of February 1835 shall be accounted for and paid over.
