INDIANA

College.

THE claims of this institution to the atten-
tion of the friends of Science, Literature,
and the advancement of the human mind,
are, it is believed, peculiarly worthy of their re-
gard. It is situated in Bloomington, which is a
pleasant and flourishing village, about 30 miles
South of Indianapolis, on the road leading from
the latter place to Leavenworth on the Ohio river,
between which points a stage route has been
authorized, and is now in operation. A better
location for the State College could not have
been secured. It is a community healthy, in the
midst of a delightful region of country, rapidly
advancing in improvement, and judiciously pro-
tected to the State, and far enough from the river for
the purposes of instruction.

The student body is judiciously removed
from the rudeness of vulgar manners, on one
hand, and sily dissipation and showy emptiness
on the other.

The college itself is administered on such
principles as to afford the special regard of
those who wish for their sons a truly liberal edu-
cation.

The course prescribed for actual study is ex-
tensive, and every step facilitates the progress of
the student, whose attention is concentrated
upon one and but one main object at a time.

A multiplicity of vexatious rules is not resorted
to in the government of the college. The
students are taught that they have a character
to form, and important interests at stake. Ap-
peals are constantly made, not in a formal
less manner, but in a judicious and persua-
sive method, of a parent in his own family, to the
honour of the students, upon some of duty, of
propriety of decorum of interest.

They are habituated, in this way, to judge in
themselves what is right, and to practise ac-
cordingly.

On religious subjects every thing of the nature
of a narrow sectarian bigotry is carefully ex-
cluded. The student is exhorted to think, judge and
choose for himself; and, in his minority, to re-
verence and obey, in such matters, the directions
of his parents. Such is the course prescribed in
the charter of the institution; a course which all
concerned in its government are more resolved
never to abandon.

Science, Literature, and
Religion, it is fondly believed, may be made
to grow and thrive together, without the un-
nearly appendages which the spirit of party, of
ten connected with them. The experiment has
never yet been made in any country—at least
fully and truly. It is going forward, suc-
cessfully as yet in Ind. College. Time will show
whether ultimate success will attend it or not.

In the mean time, the friends of liberal principles
and of pure morality and exalted piety, ought
to know and understand one another. The
means are every where in operation by which
the spirit of party goes on, in matters affecting
the great interests of education, seeks to send its all-
prevailing influence to the very bottom of society,
through every pore and every fibre—till the
whole mass becomes saturated with it. This
sate is not as honest as is plausible; nor as
generous as it is fearful. The friends and pa-
trons of Indiana College do not seek used and now
that they do not wish, in their own persons or
in their posterity, to depend on its mercy here-
after. Believing that Piety, enlightened and
exalted by Science and Literature, is both a
safeguard and an ornament to our dearest inter-
ests; and that without these it becomes a cancer
to deform at once and to destroy, they wish
this institution to be a sacred fire to hold to-
gether the wise and good of every name. To such
it will be gratifying to know that Indiana Col-
lege is in a prosperous condition. With the last
three or four years it has been steadily advanc-
ing. Heretofore students have gone to other
institutions for want of the means of ready re-
cess to this. That difficulty is now in part re-
moved, and before long will vanish entirely.

A stage route is now in operation both from
Leavenworth and from Louisville on the Ohio to
Indianapolis. By this way students from the
lower country can find a ready conveyance—
those finding at Louisville where there take the
stage which intersects the other route at Or-
leans or from Madison they can be conveyed
via Indianapolis to Bloomington.

To other in-luents may be added the cheap
rate of living and of tuition; Board from 1 dollar
to 1 50 per week; Tuition 7 50 per session.

The winter session begins the first Monday in
November and ends the last Wednesday in
March. The summer session begins the first
Monday in May and ends last Wednesday in
September; which is the day of Commencement
for conferring degrees.

KNOX COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SO-

CITY.

The Directors of the Knox County Agri-
cultural Society, in the discharge of
their duty, respectfully submit the fol-
lowing Report to the society:

The progress of the society has af-
forded much gratification, and its influ-
ence has been not only beneficial, but
manifestly so, to all observers. The So-
ciety now numbers 76 members, and
promises to increase. The Treasurer re-
ports seventeen dollars in his hands, and
there would have been twenty dollars
more, but that the Society incurred an
expense of that amount by directing the
address of last fall to be published in
pamphlet form. The Directors respect-
fully submit, that the publication of an
address in the newspapers will not cause
any expense to the Society, and that the
pamphlet form should be hereafter omit-
ted.

By the attention of the members from
this vicinity, an act of the Legislature
was procured whereby this Society is
made a Branch of the State Society, and
as such, is entitled to an appropriation of
fifty dollars from the county treasury.

At the last fall meeting the citizens of
Vincennes subscribed liberally to the ex-
penses of the Society, and the Directors
feel confident, that so long as the Society
is conducted in a proper manner, we can
rely safely on a continuance of such lib-
erality. The Directors have proposed a
list of premiums for the next fall
exhibition, and certain rules for the same,
based on the supposition that the Society
will be able to expend about two hundred
dollars in premiums and expenses. This
list of premiums, and these proposed
rules, are herewith submitted to the So-
ciety for approval.

It is proper to observe that the premi-
ums on stock are confined to breeding
stock—and this because in the opinion of
the Directors, the improvement of the
breeders would conduce more certainly
to improvement generally. These premi-
ums are also confined to young ani-
mals, and this because the object of the
Society is not so much to reward men for
past labour and care, as to stimulate fu-
ture exertion.

The above premiums are for articles of
general production, but Hemp, Tobacco
and Cotton merit premiums. The Di-
rectors propose, that if the necessary
funds can be raised, the following will be
allowed for the crops of the coming year,
to be awarded at the spring season in
1837.

The best acre of Hemp \$10
" " Tobacco 10
2d best acre of Hemp 5
2d best acre of Tobacco 5
The best acre of Cotton 5
The following rules are recommended.

1. Cattle will be classed as two year
olds, when of any age between two and
three years;—as yearlings between one
and two; and as calves, while under one
year of age. All other animals will be
classed in the same manner.

2. Between animals of the same class,
—yearlings, the committee of Judges
may take into consideration the difference
of age.

3. No animal can take more than one
premium at any one meeting, and not
more than two in its life time—one before
its maturity, and one when mature.

4. A certificate in writing will be re-
quired of the age of animals, and that they

were raised in the county, signed by the
owner and some neighbor of good stand-
ing.

5. The premiums on butter and cheese
may be claimed by citizens of the follow-
ing counties—Knox, Pike, Davies,
Green, and Sullivan, Indiana, and Craw-
ford, Lawrence and Wabash, Illinois.—
All other premiums can be claimed by in-
habitants of Knox county only—but it is
hoped, that no man will be found so small
as to claim a premium unless he has be-
come a member of the Society and con-
tributed his annual dollar.

6. Stock, farming tools, manufactured
articles and all the products of domestic
industry, are solicited from all public
spirited individuals, whether of Knox
county of the Society or not, for exhibi-
tion or sale at the Fair. And in all such
cases, it will be the duty of the Judges to
examine all such property, and to award
in their report to the owner the proper
credit.

7. Necessary food will be provided for
two nights for all animals offered for pre-
miums, or exhibited, or intended to be sold
at the Fair, by the Society without
charge. The sale will take place on the
second day. The auctioneer will serve
without charge, but the owners of prop-
erty intended for sale, must give the Sec-
retary notice by 12 o'clock of this first
day.
