The faculty are entitled to confer the degree of

Licentiate of Medicine, an extension of which will however be applied for at the ensuing session of the Legislature, and there can be no doubt but the power to confer the degree of Doctor of Medicine will be promptly granted.

Those students who may wish to stand an examination for the degree of L. M. can do so at the expiration of one course.

Those who attend the ensuing course are informed that it will be considered equivalent to a full course under the anticipated extension of the charter, and that they will be examined as candidates for the degree of M. D. by attending a second course.

when they run on the last mentioned river; and

Bon Pas creek which flows down from 40 miles above its mouth, unites its waters with those
