

shall be the duty of the treasurer, to apply or cause to be applied, the funds he may receive, for the redemption of such treasury notes; first to the redemption of the five dollar notes, and then to the fifties. And any officer or agent, of the Bank or Banks, who shall purchase any of these notes, for a less sum than their face, with the funds so deposited, shall be subject to all the penalties of the 9th section of this act.

FROM THE WABASH COURIER.

In the Wabash Enquirer, of the 13th inst. under the Editorial head, I am accused of persecuting Van Burenism in the person of the Editor. Of the truth of the allegation set forth in the indictment the editor alludes to, I have nothing to say, except that by two of the judicial tribunals of our country, they have been sustained. Through the humanity of our laws, he has another opportunity of defending himself; and I hope and trust that he may be successful; for I should regret very much an individual being immured in the walls of our penitentiary for making an affidavit which testimony proves false; and made, evidently, at the time the affidavit was drunk.
