Ireland continues the scene of disorder and unrest. One of the latest reports tells of the assassination of the Mayor of Cork. Six masked men, it is said, knocked at the door of the Lord Mayor's residence and, when Mrs. MacGurk, his wife, opened the door some of the men held her while others rushed upstairs to the Mayor's room, shot him in the chest, and escaped without leaving any clue as to their identity. But nine days previous to this outrage, Constable Scully was shot at Glenmire, in the Cork district.

The dry leaders in Ohio are optimistic as to the outcome in the re-counting of votes cast in the state prohibition referendum. The original wet majority of 479 has been cut to 159, and the dries believe they can see further reductions in the recount through alleged errors sufficient to give the prohibitionists a small majority of votes. The result, whichever way it may go, will have quite an influence on the general situation.

Democratic and Republican candidates for governor, seven of them, will be the guests and chief speakers at the banquet at the Claypool hotel, Indianapolis, April 7th, held in connection with the Franchise League convention. This is the first time that the candidates from the two parties have ever appeared at the same time. The event is arousing great interest all over the state. It is expected that this will be the largest banquet the Franchise League has ever held in consequence.

The Ex-Kaiser is being closely guarded by the Dutch Government, police officers being detailed to follow him, a few steps in the rear, as he walks about the garden of the Bentinck Castle at Amerongen. Anti-militarist and anarchist societies of Holland are reported to be arranging a demonstration against the continued residence of the Hohenzollern family in Holland.

This is going to be a lively campaign. There is no telling which way the cat will jump. A new party may spring up in the twinkling of an eye, and nominate a candidate on a platform of "more Liberty and Less Taxes," and sweep the country. A lot of people are getting tired of both the old "doctors."

A Kansas City boy swallowed a half dollar and the physicians have been unable to remove it. He should send for some of those leaders who served in the various "drives." They can get the money if anybody can.

Japan is ready to make big concessions toward an amicable settlement of the Shantung problem, according to a dispatch from Tokio. It is said that negotiations to this end have already been started.
