Ireland continues the scene of dis-  
order and unrest. One of the latest  
reports tells of the assassination of  
the Mayor of Cork. Six masked  
men, it is said, knocked at the door  
of the Lord Mayor's residence and  
when Mrs. MacGurin, his wife, opened  
the door some of the men held  
her while others rushed upstairs to  
the Mayor's room, shot her in the  
chest, and escaped without leaving  
any clue as to their identity. But  
nine days previous to this outrage,  
Constable Scully was shot at Glen-  
mine, in the Cork district.

The dry leaders in Ohio are op-  
timistic as to the outcome in the re-  
counting of votes cast in the state  
prohibition referendum. The original  
wet majority of 479 has been cut to  
159, and the drys believe they  
can see further reductions in the re-  
count through alleged errors suffi-  
cient to give the prohibitionists a  
small majority of votes. The result,  
whatever way it may go, will have  
quite an influence on the general  
situation.

Democratic and Republican candi-  
dates for governor seven of them,  
will be the guests and chief speakers  
at the banquet at the Claypool hotel,  
Indianapolis, April 7th, held in con-  
nection with the Franchise League  
convention. This is the first time  
that the candidates from the two  
parties have ever appeared at the  
same time. The event is arousing  
great interest all over the state. It  
is expected that this will be the largest  
banquet the Franchise League  
has ever held in consequence.

The Ex-Kaiser is being closely  
guarded by the Dutch Government,  
police officers being detailed to fol-  
low him, a few steps in the rear, as  
he walks about the garden of the  
Bentinck Castle at Amerongen.  
Anti-militarist and anarchist societies  
of Holland are reported to be ar-  
ranging a demonstration against the  
continued residence of the Hohenzol-  
tern family in Holland.

This is going to be a lively cam-  
paign. There is no telling which  
way the cat will jump. A new party  
may spring up in the twinkling of an  
eye, and nominate a candidate on a  
platform of "more Liberty and Less  
Taxes," and sweep the country. A  
lot of people are getting tired of  
both the old "doctors."
