cations, and extracts from the most approved

works.

In addition to the interests of the first volume,

the Editor is making preparations to enliven and

improve the **Farmer** by numerous CUTS, repre

senting more clearly the subjects above enumera

ted. As this will necessarily incur a heavy ex

penditure, a correspondent patronage is excepted and

desired.

At the request of a number of Eastern corre

spondents, the Editor intends also, in the course of

this volume to give from time to time, a condensed

view of Agricultural condition and resources of

the great Mississippi Valley—the points where
