And all attracting—against arms appeal.

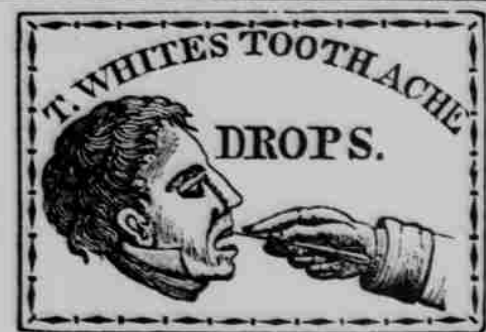
