Disorderly dinner.—A letter from Wash-
ington informs us, that the name of Jesse L. Hol-
man had been presented on the 21st of March,
to the senate. For the first time, and that no
doubt existed, that it would be confirmed with-
out objections.

Steam boat accident.—We are informed
that the steam boat Ben Franklin, once a fa-
vorite between Cincinnati and Louisville, has
recently been lost near Mobile, with a melan-
choly and immense loss of human lives.

Post mortem.—We are informed, that on
some day of last week, the coroner would be
called upon to disinter an infant, that had
been mysteriously brought into existence, de-
stroyed and recently buried, in Pleasant town-
ship. We will thank the coroner to furnish
us with the particulars.

Texas.—A Philadelphia correspondent
writes from Washington, that Gen. Gaines
and Scott have refused to recognize the orders
of Gen. Taylor, thus, while the fellows are
disputing about rank, the Indians are let at
full liberty to do as they please. The secre-
tary of war has dispatched Gen. Macomb to
Florida. Should not Gaines and Scott be
dismissed the service immediately for their
base, inhuman conduct.

Isaac Hill, has been elected governor of
New Hampshire—he is now a senator in con-
gress.

Dangerous carrier save.—A letter from
Wilmington, dated March 29, says: "I believe
the county seat is now permanently established
at this village."

John Harper, the minor son of William
Harper, of this vicinity, aged about ten or
twelve years, left his father's house on Thurs-
day last, and went into the woods and has not
been heard of since—the neighbors are in
pursuit of him, he has, although an idiot, been
in the habit of ranging the woods for some
short distance around his father's but always
returned.

Since the above was in type, we have
learned that he has since been found, very
much injured in consequence, it is supposed,
by falling from a tree, having his thigh broken
and receiving a severe contusion on the forehead.

The following is from the Mobile Register
of the first inst.—"It is said that Santa Anna
has landed in Texas at the head of twelve
thousand men. [Doubtful.] This is a for-
midable army in the present divided state of
the country. Gen. Houston and Col. Bowie
have been dismissed from the army by the
council of Texas."

Our heaviest and longest sleighing.—
The Hudson Gazette of Thursday says:
"This day makes 108 days that the ground
has been covered with snow a thing, we may
venture to say, unknown in the history of
America since its first settlement. We may
reasonably expect, from present appearances,
that the snow will last at least twenty days
longer."

Wisconsin, Territorial.—A body of men
are collected at Green Bay, who denominated
themselves a Legislative Council. This, like
the Legislature of the State of Michigan, is a
body unknown to the laws of the United
States Territories north of Ohio, Indiana and
Illinois.

Mr. Armand has given notice in the Leg-
islature of Louisiana, that he would shortly
introduce a bill to incorporate the company of
"Fox Hunters of Baton Rouge with banking
privileges."

In the Senate of the United States, on
Friday last, Mr. Clay again intimated that
he would not long remain in public life.

Eighteen new Steam-Boats have been built
at Pittsburgh during the past winter. We
learn, also, that the same spirit in boat-building
has prevailed at Wheeling during the same
period.

Between thirty and forty Rail-road bills
were considered and passed in the committee
of the Whole, of the House of Representatives
of Pennsylvania, on Thursday last. About
sixty Rail-road bills, have been reported to
the Legislature this session.

The Governor of Pennsylvania has vetoed
the bill to increase the capital of the Girard

Bank of Philadelphia. The veto produced
considerable excitement.

The New York Gazette, says—"Yesterday
was the eighteenth day since the awful
conflagration which visited our city; & yet
in many places throughout the burnt district
the ruins are still smoking."

Twenty-fourth Congress.

IN SENATE.

Monday, March 14.

Mr. Ewing, pursuant to notice, moved the
Senate to take up the bill to provide for a dis-
tribution of the proceeds of the public lands.
Mr. Buchanan moved that the Senate pro-
ceed to the consideration of the Executive bu-
siness, for the purpose of acting on some of the
communications which had been for such a
long time waiting for the action of the Senate.

After some short discussion between Mr.
Ewing, Mr. Calhoun and Mr. Benton, the
question on Mr. Ewing's motion was taken
by yeas and nays and decided in the negative,
as follows:

Thursday, March 17.

Mr. Webster moved the printing of 3000
extra copies of the report from the Secretary
of the Treasury, transmitting a statement of
the condition of the Deposit Banks—[a tabu-
lar statement which appears in the National
Intelligencer.]

Mr. Webster made some remarks showing
the dangerous situation of the public money
in these banks. In these banks the amount
of public deposits is thirty millions, and
of private deposits fifteen millions.—
The total amount of their obligations is
above 77 millions and their means to pay these
obligations but one dollar in six.

Mr. Benton concurred in the motion, con-
demned the conduct of the Deposit Banks, and
attributed it to that of the bank of the United
States.

Mr. Clay and Mr. Calhoun viewed the
condition of the treasury as very critical, and
the danger of the loss of it to the public is im-
minent.

Mr. Walker, Mr. Ewing, Mr. Walker,
and Mr. Benton took part in the debate on
the question, which was finally determined in
the affirmative—consequently the 3000 extra
copies of the document were ordered to be printed.

By a law of the Commonwealth of Mas-
sachusetts, newspapers are prohibited, on severe
penalties, from publishing any lottery adver-
tisements.

The Banking House of the old "Monster,"
at Philadelphia, is to be sold at auction, in
that city, on the 12 of April.

The Washington correspondent of the New
York Herald, gives the following as the state
of the affairs of honor on hand at the seat
of government.

Wise and Bynum were both in their seats
to-day, looking very peaceable and quiet.
Hannegan was there, too, not having yet gone
in pursuit of Lieutenant Saunders, though ac-
cording to all accounts, there is to be a meet-
ing between them. After all, the only duel
that is to be very soon, is that between old
Benjamin Hardin and Tecumseh Johnson,
nominee for the next Vice Presidency. It
seems that Mr. Hardin spoke rather freely of
Col. Johnson's domestic relations in his late
speech, and for which the Colonel to-day asked
him to account. As Col. Johnson is a crimi-
ple, care will be taken so to arrange mat-
ters as to fix him a rest, but as to Hardin, he
is able as he says in his speech, to shoot on
the wing, as well as at rest.
