The subscriber, at the solicitation of many of the citizens of Vevay, and others, who believe that the improvement of said town would be greatly promoted thereby, has laid off, into building lots, that part of the **BOTTOM** between the built part of said town and the Ohio river, through which Ferry-street, (being the principal business street,) runs, situated immediately opposite the main steam boat landing; for the disposal of which, and also of sundry other lots in said town, a **PUBLIC SALE**, will be held on the premises, to begin on

## Monday, September 19,

And continue from day to day, for three or four days, unless sooner closed.

**TERMS**—One fourth part of the purchase money, **secure the payment of which, no other security will be required, except the purchaser's bond, & a lien on the property. Further particulars and conditions, will be made known on the day of, and previous to the sale.**

The town of Vevay, the seat of justice of Switzerland county, in the state of Indiana, is handsomely situated; commodiously and liberally laid out on the Ohio river, half way by water between Cincinnati and Louisville, and on the most direct route from Lexington, Ky. to Indianapolis, Ia.

A company to construct a Macadamized road from Georgetown, Ky., to Ghent, on the Ohio river opposite Vevay, was incorporated by the Legislature of Kentucky at their last session—the state to take part of the stock. The Legislature of Indiana at their last session, likewise incorporated a company to construct a similar road from Vevay to Napoleon, where it will intersect the Michigan road, and the Rail Road from Lawrenceburg to Indianapolis, which roads when completed will be a connecting link between the great line of roads now under construction in Kentucky and those about to be commenced in our own state—necessarily rendering Vevay a most important point on the Ohio river. The daily line of mail boats, plying between Cincinnati and Louisville, regularly touch at the Vevay landing to exchange mails, to receive and put out passengers and goods. Besides the water mails from Louisville and Cincinnati, Vevay has the advantages of sundry land mails from the east and the west, and from the north and the south; some of which are tri-weekly.

The bridges across Indian creek below and Plumb creek above, to which, the legislature has appropriated some money, have been commenced; which, when completed will render Vevay easily accessible to all times from all parts of the county, without ferrying, and will tend largely to increase the trade.

Owing to its advantages, Vevay was selected by the commission-

ers appointed by the legislature as the most suitable place for the county seat; and accordingly did establish the seat of justice of said county of Switzerland, to be and remain permanently fixed on the public square of said town, where the court house now stands. Lately, the commissioners similarly appointed to select a site for the county Seminary of said county, have located the same on a beautiful eminence adjoining said town, commanding a beautiful view of the same, and of the romantic scenery around. On which site a building has been erected, and is expected, will be ready for the reception of students next spring.

The vicinity is admired for its neat farms, extensive orchards, and the celebrated vineyards which afford an agreeable, wholesome and cheap wine, to the use of which, the nonappearance of the cholera, and the unrivalled health of Vevay for the last fifteen years may in some degree be justly attributed.

Materials for building can be obtained here, as cheap as at any other place on the Ohio river. The country back, abounds with a great variety of the best timber, and many saw mills are in operation on Plumb and Indian creeks, from two to eight miles from town; in addition to which, there is in said town in full operation, one of the best Steam Saw-mills in the western country, owned by Capts John Sheets and Vincent Dufour; all of which will no doubt soon attract the attention of boat builders, as the Island above town affords a good shelter for steam and other boats, in time of ice.

Stone for building and paving are abundant and convenient as well as clay of the best quality for making brick.

Possessing so many advantages, Vevay must at no very remote period become, if not a city, at least one among the best towns on the great Ohio river.


