Three per cent fund.—The treasurer of state
gave notice, on the 11th instant, that he had
received a further sum of \$155 12s for each
county, which was ready for distribution; in
addition to the sums received in June and
September last. About \$1,200, of this fund
added to the \$7,500, the one half of the sur-
plus revenue fund, will secure to our farmers
GOOD ROADS. — We recommend, that
the inhabitants of each congressional town-

Steam boat disaster.—On the 18th inst. above
the Rising Sun, the steam boat Flora, broke
her connecting pipe, causing the death of one
man, and maiming thirteen others; all cabin
passengers but one; among them, badly scalded,
was George L. Kinnard, one of our mem-
bers of congress. Report says Mr. K. is dead.

Surplus Revenue.—Should the legislature of
our state, and of which, I have no doubt, ac-
cept the loan of her quota of the surplus fund
under the act passed by the last congress, a-
bout \$1,500,000 will be coming to Indiana.
Two hundred and fifty thousand dollars have
already been deposited at Indianapolis,
of this money. What shall be done with it?
It will be remembered, that this money is loaned,
(not donated) to the state, without inter-
est; and to be refunded or paid back, when-
ever needed by the general government, &c.
And when it shall be called it, it will have to
be raised by TAXING THE PEOPLE!!! Let the
people, then, have the immediate and sole be-
nefit of the loan, and then, when you call it
in from them, to pay it back again, they will
not murmur nor grumble. If the loan be di-
vided among the people, according to repre-
sentation, Switzerland county will be entitled
to about two thousand, five hundred dollars,
out of the money already deposited, and a like
sum for every succeeding \$250,000—the quo-
ta coming to Indiana, within the next year, in
all probability, will amount to one million and
a half of dollars, of which Switzerland will
be entitled to about fifteen thousand dollars.
Now let one half of this sum be placed in the
common school fund of our county, so that all
our children may be educated.—And let the
balance be expended on our public highways,
and then we will all have good roads through
our plantations.

Many politicians, are in favor of giving this
money to the mammoth internal improvement
speculators, to pay the interest on the money
already borrowed by them. Citizens of Swit-
zerland, will you submit to such a disposition
of it? I trust not—you will not consent to
pay tribute to some half a dozen favorite
towns, who are infected with a mania, that
has entailed burdens upon you and your chil-
dren for five generations to come.

Another class, want it expended in making
a splendid turnpike across the county. Will
you consent to that disposition of it? I think
not; for that road will be no earthly benefit
to eight tenths of you; and you may be called
upon to refund the money, by taxation too
long before that road is completed. The leg-
islature, cannot object to Switzerland county
appropriating her share of the money, in her
own way. As every man, who uses coffee,
&c. contributes to make this surplus fund, so
let him insist on having an immediate share
in the benefits arising therefrom.
