

67 Yesterday morning, says the Louisville Courier, of the 20 inst., two boys who were engaged on the bank of Beargrass near the foot of Shelly street watching a drove of sheep, observed two women go near the creek, dig a hole and deposit the box therein. Actuated by curiosity, after the women had retired, the boys went to the place, disinterred the remains and having broken open the box, discovered in it the remains of two children. The infants were new-born, and of different sex. The girl was fully developed, but the boy appeared to be a conception of about six months. Marshal White was sent for and took charge of the bodies, until Coronor Green arrived. The jury after an inquest, rendered a verdict in accordance with the above facts. The remains were buried in the Work House grave yard. No clue has as yet been discovered concerning the human parents of these children.
