5 A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS from the late division of the Territory it has become necessary to make a new apportionment of the Representatives to the general assembly; I have thought proper to issue this, my proclamation, hereby directing and declaring that the house of representatives shall, at the next general assembly be composed of eight members, of which, the county of Knox shall furnish three; the county of Clark, two; the county of Dearborn, two; and the county of Harrison, one. And I do further direct that the election for the additional representative from the counties of Knox, Clark and Dearborn, and for the member hereby assigned to the county of Harrison, shall be held on Monday the twenty second day of May next ensuing, at the places in the several townships of the said counties respectively, which have, or may be assigned by the courts of Common Pleas of said counties for that purpose.

Done at Vincennes, in the said Territory, on the fourth of April, one thousand eight hundred and nine.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by an act of Congress, passed at their last session, the Governor of the Indiana Territory, was empowered and directed to divide the said Territory into five districts, each of which to be entitled to send one member to the Legislative Council of the Territory. Now therefore be it known, that the five districts as aforesaid shall be formed as follows, viz.—The county of Dearborn, shall form one district; the county of Clark, one district; the county of Harrison, one district; the townships of Bufferon, Palmyra, and Vincennes, in the county of Knox, one district; and the townships of Harrison, White river, Wabash and Ohio, in the said county of Knox, another district. And I do further direct and order that the election for the said members of the legislative council, shall be held at the same time, and at the same places, as are fixed by my proclamation of the fourth of this instant, for the election of an additional Representative; and the proceedings in the said election shall be the same as prescribed by law for the election of Representatives.

Given under my hand, and the seal of the Territory, at Vincennes, this tenth day of April, one thousand [L.S.] eight hundred and nine, and of the Independence of the United States, the thirty third.

FOR THE WESTER SUN.

TO WILLIAM BRUCE.

On hearing that you were about to make a declaration in the Western Sun of your being a candidate to represent the people of Knox county in the general assembly, I could not but inquire into the reason why you should be so defective in wisdom. I was immediately informed (which has since been verified by the actual appearance of your piece) that you asserted you had been so repeatedly and pressingly solicited, that you was obliged to yield, tho' you complied with diffidence.—At hearing of that, I promised to address myself to you on that subject. And now I would inquire of mr. Bruce, who it was that pressed, and so re-

peatedly pressed him to offer his service? was it his neighbors? No—they are too well acquainted with him, they know his acquirements and stability.—I would rather solicit mr. Bruce to inquire of his neighbors whether they thought him capable of representing them or not—I conceive they are not novices, but men of discernment and candour—and if they think that he is not a man of sense and integrity, it is hoped that he will not impose himself upon those not acquainted with him—

I am persuaded not one of his neighbors ever solicited him on the subject, but on the contrary, are disgusted at the very thought of his offering himself. No doubt they believe he has vanity enough to think he is a very sensible fellow—notwithstanding his ignorance in this matter. I suppose mr. Bruce thinks (or I hope is made to think) the very saying he is opposed to slavery, is sufficient to elect him or any other person that would make use of that language, and I suppose by that means has got the words freedom & republican always at hand—he ought to have considered that if the expressing, or inserting these words in the W. Sun, would insure an election, that others would be elected on the same terms who are able to support the principle and policy by sound reasoning. But this is not the man that is wanted at this time—we want a man that is anxious to represent the wishes of a majority of his constituents, and has acquired a portion of legislative knowledge—not a man that is unacquainted with that knowledge which constitutes a legislator, and is anxious to mount the public stage without consulting his own abilities, or his neighbors approbation—I am sorry that I have to repeat it again, that they are disgusted at the very idea of mr. Bruce's coming forward, notwithstanding I believe a majority of them are as much opposed to slavery as himself; but mr. B. is gone out from amongst his poor neighbors, why should I be astonished, he cannot associate with the holder of a bound servant, without he will submit to him to limit the term of their servitude. Mark his lately stippings in the Borough of Vincennes, with those men of our nation who are continually finding fault with our government, the executive, and the executive measures; not, I am afraid with pure motives, but with sinister views; making slavery cloak to answer other purposes; they know that to have slavery admitted into this territory, while it is a territory, is out of the question, but still they are not willing to let the subject sleep, but keep it on the carpet to induce the good honest citizens of this county to vote for the man that has just a sufficiency of knowledge to be a dupe for their pride and ambition.—I would not be understood by mr. Bruce, that I conceive his neighbors entertain a low opinion of him, but on the contrary, a favorable one, as a private citizen—their opposition to his election arises from a conviction that he is inadequate to discharge the duties of legislation.
