Governor and Commander in Chief of the Indiana Territory, and Commissioner Plenipotentiary of the United States for concluding a Treaty or Treaties with the Indians North West of the Ohio.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS conferences are about to be commenced in the town of Vincennes, with certain of the Indian Tribes, on subjects interesting as well to the Territory, as the United States—and whereas the laws of the Territory authorise and empower the Governor of said Territory to prohibit the sale of any ardent or intoxicating liquors to the Indians, pending any Treaty or Conference.—Now therefore I have thought proper to issue this my proclamation prohibiting the sale or disposition of any spirits or other intoxicating liquors, to, or amongst the Indians, on any pretence whatsoever, in the Town of Vincennes, or within thirty miles of the same.

Given under my hand, and the seal of the Territory, at Vincennes this twenty-third day of August, one thousand eight hundred and nine, and of the Independence of the United States the thirty fourth.
