Boston, August 8.—The new British ambassador was not to leave London till the 25th Jun.—His delay will probably occasion his instructions to be more favorable; as the numerous arrivals will show the faith of the Americans in the validity of Mr. Eschsch's settlement. Our continuance of the non-intercourse as to France (of which they seemed to have doubts) will also have a good effect.

London, June 24—This day two Gotenburg mails arrived. The duke of Sudermania has been elected, crowned & proclaimed king by the title of Charles VIII.

Charles IV. his queen, and the prince of peace, are still at Maribolles; they inhabit one of the finest hotels in that city, and live at a very expensiverate.

The fine town of Schwartz, in the valley of the Inn, and in the neighbourhood of which is the celebrated silver mine, was burnt down on the 18th of May, during a conflict between the Tyrolese and Bavarians, consisted of 640 houses and comprised a population of about 5000 souls, 1200 of whom, including 800 women and children perished in the flames.

Helsingborg, June 13.—The emperor of Russia is on his journey to Koenigsberg. The purport of his journey is to obtain an interview with the king of Prussia, respecting matters that at present can only be conjectured.

London, June 28.—The Plover, which arrived on Tuesday at Plymouth, spoke several neutral vessels from France the masters of which informed her, that all the French privateers have been laid up, and their crews sent to join the French armies. The following extract of a letter from

Memel, seems to give the negative to the rumour that Prussia had declared against France:—

MEMEL, May 21.—War has now actually been declared by our government against Austria, and a Russian army is marching through East Prussia against the corps of the archduke Ferdinand, who is retreating from the Vistula. The king of Prussia remains neutral, and seems to be entirely influenced by the Russian government.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS conferences are about to be commenced in the town of Vincennes, with certain of the Indian Tribes, on subjects interesting as well to the Territory, as the United States—and whereas the laws of the Territory authorize and empower the Governor of said Territory to prohibit the sale of any ardent or intoxicating liquors to the Indians, pending any Treaty or Conference.—Now therefore I have thought proper to issue this my proclamation prohibiting the sale or disposition of any spirits or other intoxicating liquors, to, or amongst the Indians, on any pretence whatsoever in the Town of Vincennes, or within thirty miles of the same.

Given under my hand, and the seal of the Territory, at Vincennes this twenty-third day of August, one [L.S.] thousand eight hundred and nine, and of the Independence of the United States the thirty fourth.
