VINCENNES, SEPTEMBER 16, 1809.

The last mails brought no news of a later date than before received.

A duel was fought on Wednesday the 30th ult. on the bank of Ohio, opposite Augusta (Ken.) by David Trimble and Henry Daniel, in which Mr. Daniel's was wounded, but not thought dangerous.

The president has left the city of Washington, for Montpelier, and it is said will not return until the arrival of the British minister.

SUMMARY.

By the arrival of the Fair Trader, Capt. Shackleford, at Boston, London papers to the 8th ult. and letters to the 10th have been received. In consequence of the expedition being nearly in readiness to sail from England, orders had been given for a general embargo in Great Britain & Ireland. The expedition was expected to be in readiness on the 15th or 16th of July. It is to consist of 35,000 men, and the quantity of artillery, both field and battering is so numerous as to render it extremely probable that a sudden attack is meditated on some place of strength. Every officer employed is ignorant of the destination but it is conjectured to be destined for the island of Walcheren on the coast of Holland.

Mr. Jackson, had not sailed for America at the last date; but it appears that he had taken leave of his majesty for that purpose.

It was reported and believed at Heligoland on the 21 inst. that another battle had taken place between the two grand armies on the Danube, in which the French were defeated with great loss. The report is corroborated by an arrival at New York from Lisbon.

Intelligence was received at London on the 30th July from Coruña, announcing the entire evacuation of Galicia, by the armies under Ney and Soult, whose united forces have been reduced to 12,000 men. They carried with them 6000 sick & wounded. The port of Ferrol is again delivered from the army.

St. Andro was taken by the patriots, & two days afterwards was retaken by the French. Joseph was at Madrid.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS conferences are about to be commenced in the town of Vincennes, with certain of the Indian Tribes, on subjects interesting as well to the Territory, as the United States—and whereas the laws of the Territory authorise and empower the Governor of said Territory to prohibit the sale of any ardent or intoxicating liquors to the Indians, pending any Treaty or Conference.—Now therefore I have thought proper to issue this my proclamation prohibiting the sale or disposition of any spirits or other intoxicating liquors, to, or amongst the Indians, on any pretence whatsoever, in the Town of Vincennes, or within thirty miles of the same.

Given under my hand, and the seal of the Territory, at Vincennes this twenty-third day of August, one thousand eight hundred and nine, and of the Independence of the United States the thirty fourth.
