

Sachusetts, the town of Springfield excepted.

8th. At any place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited, within the state of Connecticut and Rhode Island.

9th. At any place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited, within the state of New York, Niagara and its dependencies excepted.

10th. At any place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited, within the state of New Jersey.

11th. At any place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited, within the state of Pennsylvania.

12th. At any place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited, within the states of Maryland, Delaware, and the District of Columbia.

13. At any place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited within the state of Virginia.

14th. At any place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited, within the state of North Carolina.

15th. At any place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited, within the state of South Carolina.

16th. At Ocmulgee, Old Fields, and at any place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited, within the limits of the state of Georgia.

17th. Proposals will also be received, as aforesaid, for the supply of all rations which may be required by the United States, for the troops which are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited, within the town of Springfield, in the state of Massachusetts; and for the armorers, and other persons employed in the United States armory at that place, from the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eleven, inclusive, to the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and twelve.

A ration to consist of one pound and one quarter of beef, or three quarters of a pound of pork, eighteen ounces of bread or flour, one gill of rum, whiskey, or brandy, and at the rate of two quarts of salt, four quarts of vinegar, four pounds of soap, and one pound and a half of candles, to every hundred rations. The prices of the several component parts of the ration shall be specified; but the United States reserve the right of making such alterations in the price of the component parts of the ration as shall make the price of each part thereof bear a just proportion to the proposed price of the whole ration. The rations are to be furnished in such quantities, that there shall at all times during the term of the proposed contract, be sufficient for the consumption of the troops at Michilimackinac, Detroit, Fort Olajé, and Belle Vue, Chicago, for six months in advance; and at each of the ports on the western waters, for at least three months in advance, of good and wholesome provisions if the same shall be required. It is also to be permitted to all and every of the commandants of fortified places or posts, to call for at seasons when the same can be transported, or at any time in case of urgency, such supplies of like provisions in advance, as in the discretion of the commandant shall be deemed proper.

It is understood that the contractor is to be at the risk of issuing the supplies to the troops, and that all losses sustained by the depredations of the enemy, or by means of the troops of the United States, shall be paid by the United States, at the price of the articles captured or destroyed, as aforesaid, on the deposition of two or more persons of credible characters, and the certificate of a commissioned officer, stating the circumstances of the loss, and the amount of the articles for which compensation shall be claimed.

The privilege is understood to be reserved to the United States, of requiring that none of the supplies, which may be furnished under any of the proposed contracts, shall be issued, until the supplies which have been, or may be furnished under the contracts now in force, have been consumed; and that a supply in advance, may be always required at any of the fixed posts on the sea board, or Indian frontier, not exceeding three months.

BY THE PRESIDENT

of the UNITED STATES.

WHEREAS, by the second section of the act, entitled "An act making provision for the disposal of the Public Lands, situated between the United States military Tract, and the Connecticut reserve, and for other purposes," passed March third, one thousand eight hundred and seven, it is enacted, That all the lands of the United States, in the therein mentioned districts, not otherwise disposed of, or excepted by the said act, shall be offered for sale to the highest bidder, under the direction of the Register of the Land Office, and the Receiver of Public Monies, at the places respectively where the Land Offices are kept, and on such day or days as shall by proclamation of the President of the United States, be designated for that purpose.

AND WHEREAS, by the third section of the act entitled, "An act providing for the sale of certain lands in the Indiana Territory, and for other purposes," passed April thirtieth, one thousand eight hundred and ten, it is enacted, that from and after the first day of June, next following, the second principal meridian established by the Surveyor General, in the Indiana Territory, shall be the boundary between the District of Vincennes and Jeffersonville, and that the lands included in the said districts respectively shall become a part of the districts in which they are included.

AND WHEREAS, by the first section of the act entitled, "An act concerning the sale of the lands of the United States, and for other purposes," passed, March thirty first, one thousand eight hundred and eight, it is enacted,—That whenever the president of the United States, has been, or may be authorized to cause the public lands in any land district to be offered for sale, it shall be lawful, whenever he shall think it convenient, to offer for sale, at first only a part of the lands contained in such district, and at any subsequent time, or times, to offer for sale in the same manner, any other part, or the remainder of the land contained in the same.

WHEREFORE, I, JAMES MADISON, President of the United States, in conformity with the provisions of the acts aforesaid,—Do hereby declare and make known, that, sales for the disposal of the following described quarter
