VINCENNES, OCTOBER 27, 1812.

The last mail did not furnish a single article of news, either foreign or domestic, of any importance.

Of gen. Hopkins we have heard nothing since our last.

By the last accounts from col. Russell, it appears he left fort Russell, on Sunday the 18th inst with a party of between 5 and 600 men against the Indian towns up the Illinois river.

We learn by gentlemen direct from Louisville, that it was reported there that Niagara has been taken—we give the report as we received it.

Extract of a letter from a gentleman at St. Stephens (Mis. Ty.) to his friend in this town, dated September 26, 1812.

"The Spaniards are evidently preparing for a vigorous defence of the country below. Two months ago 120 black troops arrived at Pensacola from Havanna, and very lately 160 more have arrived, and destined as it is said, for the fort at Mobile.

Should they not have reached the latter place before our gun boats got into the bay, their passage will be resifted; but as these have been much injured by the late hurricane, I fear that they may not have arrived in time.

More troops are expected by the Spaniards at Pensacola, with six gun boats.

The prospects in this country are truly gloomy. Palladium.

Montpelier, September 17.

From all parts of the country we receive accounts of the movements of the troops and militia. Pittsburgh, N. Y. about 60 miles from Montreal, is their place of destination, where generals Dearborn & Bloomfield, have already arrived with about 2000 men each. The 6th regt. under col. Simons; the 15th, col. Pike, and the 18th, col. Schuyler, all New-England troops are on their march to join the army at Pittsburgh, under gen. Dearborn; the 6th & 15th regts. from New York, were to march on the 2d inst. It is stated that general Bloomfield of New Jersey, is to command the van of the army on the expedition.

Supplies for the Army.—The Aurora informs us that abundant provision has been made to supply the army with clothing of American manufacture. Large quantities of home-made Kerseys, of a very superior quality, have been contracted for, & in part received. A single woollen manufacturer in New-Hampshire has contracted to furnish 5000 yards per month.—Even blankets appear to be coming forward in sufficient quantities.—One individual has offered to furnish a million of pounds of gun-

powder per annum. The prices of these articles are considerably reduced, and the editor says, 'the supplies from domestic resources are so ample as to keep foreign monopolists and foresters in check; and after the present year, such are the resources of the country, that we shall not require a single article of foreign manufacture to supply the army should it be required to clothe 50,000 men.'

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PROROSALS

For carrying Mails of the United States on the following Post Roads will be received at the General Post office in Washington City, until the 29th day of August next inclusive.

IN INDIANA.

52. From Jeffersonville by Charlestown, Madison, and Laurensburg and Franklin c. h. to Wayne c. h. once in two weeks.

Leave Jeffersonville every other Monday at 6 a. m. and arrive at Wayne c. h. on Wednesday at 6 p. m.—Leave Wayne c. h. every other Thursday at 6 a. m. and arrive at Jeffersonville on Saturday by 6 p. m.

NOTES.

1. The post master general may expedite the mails, and alter the times for arrival and departure at any time during the continuance of the contract, he previously stipulating an adequate compensation for any extra expense that may be occasioned thereby.

2. Fifteen minutes shall be allowed for opening and closing the mail, at all offices where no particular time is specified.

3. For every thirty minutes delay (unavoidable accidents excepted) in arriving after the times prescribed in any contract, the contractor shall forfeit one dollar; and if the delay continues until the departure of any depending mail, whereby the mails destined for such depending mail lose a trip, a forfeiture of double the amount allowed for carrying the mail one trip shall be incurred, unless it shall be made to appear that the delay was occasioned by unavoidable accident; in which case the amount of pay for the trip will, in all cases, be forfeited and retained.

4. Persons making proposals are desired to state their prices by the year. Those who contract will receive their pay quarterly—in the months of February, May, August and November, one month after the expiration of each quarter.

5. No other than a free white person shall be employed to convey the mail.

6. When the proposer intends to convey the mail in the body of a stage carriage, he is desired to state it in his proposals.

7. The post master general reserves to himself the right of declaring any contract at an end whenever one failure happens, which amounts to the loss of a trip.

8. The contracts are to be in operation on the 1st day of November next, and continue until December 31, 1814, for the routes No. 1 to 33, inclusive, & for the other routes to December 31, 1813.
