VINCENNES, APRIL, 9, 1814.

The last mail was particularly barren of news, not furnishing us a single article of any moment, either foreign or domestic.—But to compensate our readers for the deficiency on this score, we have, by the politeness of Mr. Jennings, the pleasure of laying before our readers some important documents concerning our militia—they will, no doubt, be found interesting to many of you.

We have within a few days past, heard a variety of reports respecting Indians, none of which, we can at present place confidence in. By information from the west, it appears considerable danger is apprehended in the Missouri and Illinois territory.

A duel was fought on the 27th ult. in this territory, between J. Taylor, and C. L. Harrison, both of the U. S. army. Mr. Harrison was slightly wounded.—L. Core.

Baltimore, March 5.

Extract of a letter to the editor, dated Sackett's Harbor, February, 18th, 1814.

There are some expectations of an attack from the British; but the troops here are well prepared to receive them. Our force is about 4000 regulars and 2000 seamen, and it is daily augmenting. There are 450 carpenters busily employed in completing three large vessels, two of which are to carry 32 guns each, and the third 44;—they will be ready to sail in April. The keels of two others are laid, one to mount 44, to other 50 guns.

Salem, March 5.

Yesterday arrived in this town, & immediately embarked on board the cartel ship Bostock, 260 British troops, prisoners of war—160 of them belonged to De Witt's German regt. and were captured last fall on lake Ontario by Commodore Chauncey. They left Pittsfield ten days since. The Germans were remarkably stout, hardy looking men. About 20 of them have made their escape during the march, the Germans having a great aversion to returning to the British service.

We understand the Bostock will fail to-morrow, for Halifax.

New-York, March 14.

Extract of a letter from Providence, R. I. dated on Friday morning last.

We have news from Newport that the Constitution frigate has taken a sloop of war, and that she has arrived at Newport.
