DARLINGTON.

THE sale of Lots in the town of Dar-
lington, the seat of Justice for War-
rick county, Indiana territory, will com-
mence on Thursday the 27th day of Octo-
ber next.

This town is layed off on a beautiful le-
vel of 300 acres of land, of an excellent
soil, above the mouth of Cyprès creek, and
20 miles above the Red Banks, & 70 from
Shawneetown. This situation is not imme-
diately on the bank of the Ohio river it
stands back about three fourths of a mile,
on a beautiful eminence, between Cyprès
and Little Pidgeon creeks.

At the two latter places, are excellent
harbors for boats—and, as to the site for
the town, it is perhaps surpassed by none in
the western country; in fact, this place
had once been selected by commissioners
appointed by a special act of the legislature
for the permanent seat of Justice for War-
rick county, but in consequence of an ad-
vantage being taken of them, they were
unable to secure this admirable situation for
the county seat. The legislature having

procured a title to the land & permanently
fixed the seat of Justice thereon, it is pre-
sumable from its admirable situation, in the
midst of a flourishing settlement, surround-
ed by much habitable land, in soil & quali-
ty not inferior to any in the territory, will
be a sufficient preventative to that confu-
sion and discontent which has heretofore
injured the sale of lots in the new towns in
the western parts of this territory.

DARLINGTON is situated about 50
miles from Vincennes, 25 from Princeton,
the seat of Justice in Gibson county—an
excellent road can be had to either of those
places, and the period is not distant, when
merchants and traders will from economy,
transport their goods across from Darling-
ton to Princeton and Vincennes, in pre-
ference to the circuitous route of the Ohio
and Wabash rivers—and indeed, in some
seasons of the year it is impossible to navi-
gate the Wabash for weeks, and I could
say months—in the fall low water obstructs
its navigation, in the winter ice. In fact
the advantages which this place enjoys are
so many and so obvious, it is vanity to at-
tempt to describe them—indeed an attempt
would be presumptuous.

RUSSELLVILLE.

THE sale of lots in the town of Rus-
sellville, will take place on the last
Monday in October next.

Russellville, is situate on the south bank
of White river, in almost a direct line from
Vincennes to the mouth of Big Pidgeon
creek (Evanville) the present seat of Jus-
tice of Warrick county. Russellville is si-
tuate on a bold bank of White river, about
midway between its mouth and the junc-
tion of the East and West branch; surroun-
ded by a high and fertile country—in point
of situation is surpassed by no town in the
territory, there being two streams that em-
pty into White river, one in the centre of
the town, and the other at the lower edge;
either calculated to conduct water to the
centre or any other part of the town, or to
be applied to machinery, such as fulling
mills, carding and roving machines, &c.

Russellville will be laid out in squares of
two acres, deducting streets, which will be
49½ feet wide, except on the bank of the
river, which street will be 66 feet wide—a
small situation will be given as a donation
to the town on the river bank for a market
house.—Each square will be subdivided in-
to four lots.

A credit of two years will be given to
purchasers on their giving bond with ap-
proved security, including in the bond one dol-
lar per lot for the expense of drawing the
conveyance, which will be executed by the
proprietor upon the giving of bond and se-
curity.

immediately.
