



## THE WESTERN SUN.

VINCENNES, JANUARY 7, 1815.

The last mail was particularly barren of news, scarcely furnishing an article worthy of notice—and not a sentence on the late rumor of peace.

We feel a pleasure in announcing a second performance by the Theatrical Association—their advertisement is published in this day's paper.

### EARTHQUAKE, New-York, Dec. 8.

On Monday last, the 28th ult. was felt at Albany, Boston, Portland, Wiscasset, Woodstock, &c. at times lasted, probably from difference in clocks, from 10 minutes before to 14 minutes after 7 o'clock in the evening, just after the moon had risen.—Its continuance, (says the Eastern Argus) was about 40 seconds, with a loud rumbling noise and much agitation of the earth, and went off in a northern course, with a noise resembling a multiplicity of carriages at speed over the frozen ground. The evening was remarkably fine—not a cloud appeared in the horizon, and the moon in its full splendour—and during the shock there was scarce a sufficiency of air to ruffle the surface of the water.

Baltimore, Dec. 14.

The schooner Antrim from Patuxent arrived at 10 o'clock on Monday next, left Patuxent in the morning. A gentleman, passenger, informs that at 12 o'clock they discovered a ship of the line with a brig in company standing after them in chase, which they continued until sunset, at which time the Antrim, hauled her wind to come into the Patuxent, they were then lessening sail off Thomas's Point, but had not come to anchor; they fired some shot at the small schooner, which appeared to be hugging the eastern shore with a view to run into Choptank.

LATER.

A ship and a brig had passed Annapolis on Tuesday evening, & several vessels with in sight from the state house, standing up.
