

and station of each, and the military regulations, in like cases, together with the necessary transportation, as well for the men as for their baggage, provisions & cannon: *Provided nevertheless*, That the contract price of the rations which may be furnished shall be reimbursed out of the appropriations for the support of the navy.

Sec. 2. *And be it further enacted*, That the respective quartermasters of the army shall, upon the requisition of the commanding naval officer of any such detachment of frigate and marines, furnish the said officer and his necessary aids, with horses, accoutrements and forage, during the time they may be employed in co-operating with the land troops shoreward.

AN ORDINANCE to provide for the legal promulgation of the Ordinances passed by the Trustees in Council assembled of the Borough of Vincennes.

Sec. 1. *BE it ordained and enacted by the Trustees of the Borough of Vincennes*, That it shall be the duty of the town clerk, from the time being, within five days after the passage of any ordinance, to cause copies of the same to be put up in at least three of the most public places of the said borough; and immediately after so putting up the said three copies of the ordinances, to make out an affidavit, stating that he had discharged that duty agreeably to the provisions of the constitution of the act of assembly of this territory, entitled 'An act to incorporate the Borough of Vincennes,' passed the sixth September, A. D. 1814—a copy of which affidavit shall be deposited with, and filed by the officer administering the oath, and another copy placed on the minutes of the proceedings of the council; which said affidavits so as aforesaid filed, shall be held and taken to be, at all times, as full and sufficient evidence of the promulgation of the ordinances of the corporation of the Borough of Vincennes, agreeably to the provisions of the herein before recited act of assembly.

AN ORDINANCE to prevent the Streets, Lanes and Alleys from incumbrance, providing against Drunkenness, Sabbath breaking, &c. within the limits of the Borough of Vincennes.

Sec. 1. *BE it ordained and enacted by the Trustees in Council assembled of the Borough of Vincennes*, That if any person of the age of sixteen years and upwards, shall be found in the streets, or in any public house of entertainment within this borough, intoxicated, and on being so excited any noise, contention or disturbance, it shall be lawful for any justice of the peace, on complaint or view thereof, to cause such person or persons to pay a fine of two dollars, with costs of prosecution, for every such offence.

Sec. 2. *And be it further ordained and enacted*, That if any person or persons, shall gallop any horse, mare, or gelding, or drive any wagon, cart or sled, faster than a slow trot, in any street within this Borough, every person so offending, shall on conviction thereof before any justice of the peace, or on view of such justice, forfeit & pay the sum of two dollars, with cost.

Sec. 3. *And be it further ordained and enacted*, That if any person or persons shall be found revelling, fighting, or quarrelling, doing or performing any worldly employment, or business whatsoever, on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, (works of necessity or charity only excepted) or shall use or practice any unlawful game, sport or diversion whatsoever, or shall be found hunting, shooting or fishing on the said day within the limits of this Borough, and be convicted thereof, every person so offending, shall, for every such offence, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding two dollars, with costs of suit.

Sec. 4. *And be it further ordained and enacted*, That if any merchant, retailer of goods, owners or renters of tipping houses or dram shops, who shall sell or vend any goods, merchandize, or any spirituous or fermented liquors, on the first day of the

week (commonly called Sunday) within the limits of this Borough, shall on conviction thereof before any justice of the peace in the same, pay a fine of ten dollars for each and every such offence, with costs of prosecution.

Sec. 5. *And be it further ordained and enacted*, That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the passage thereof.
