AN ACT authorizing the Secretary of the treasury to appoint a Clerk in the office of the Commissioner of the Revenue, with power to sign licenses.

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That the head of the treasury department shall be, and he is hereby authorized from time to time, as may be requisite, to designate a clerk in the office of the commissioner of the revenue, to assist in the signing of the licenses issuing from that office; and the clerk so designated, shall have power to sign his own name to such licenses; which signature shall be as valid as that of the said commissioner of the revenue.

AN ORDINANCE in aid and amendment and repealing part of the ordinance, entitled 'An ordinance providing against Sabbath breaking, &c.'

Sec. 1. BE it ordained and enacted by the Trustees in Council assembled, of the Borough of Vincennes, That nothing contained in the above recited act shall be so construed, as to prevent any person or persons, from selling and procuring on Sunday, all the necessaries, to travellers passing on their journey on that day through this borough; and that so much of the fourth section of the said ordinance as respects the fine imposed of ten dollars for the offence therein mentioned, be, and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 2. And be it further ordained and enacted, That instead of the above repealed fine, a fine not exceeding five dollars, and no less than two dollars, with costs of prosecution be, and the same is hereby imposed.

Sec. 3. And be it further ordained and enacted, That this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after the passage thereof.

AN ORDINANCE to prevent the storing of gun powder, and of shooting any fire

arms within the limits of the borough of Vincennes.

WHEREAS, the keeping of large quantities of gun powder in stores and private houses, within the limits of this borough, is pregnant with the most calamitous consequences to the lives and property of its inhabitants, whom an accidental fire may plunge at once into irretrievable ruin: And whereas, such imprudent & inhuman, if not criminal practice, hitherto unrestrained, ought to be effectually checked before the misfortunes (it is calculated to produce) may take place—therefore,

Sec. 1. BE it ordained and enacted by the Trustees of the Borough of Vincennes, in Council assembled, That a fine not exceeding twenty dollars, nor less than ten dollars, with costs of prosecution, be imposed on any person, who shall keep in any house, shop, cellar, store, or other place within the limits of this borough, any greater quantity of gun powder than twenty pounds, after the first day of October next, one half of which fine shall be paid to the informer, and the other half to the use of this borough.

Sec. 2. And be it further ordained and enacted, That a fine of four dollars, with costs of prosecution, be imposed on any person who shall at any time discharge any fire arms, within the limits of this borough, one half of which fine shall be paid to the informer, and the other half to the use of this borough.

Sec. 3. And be it further ordained and enacted, That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the passage thereof.

BUSSERON.
THIS town was first named and published, 'Indiana,' the proprietors for the sake of perspicuity have changed it to BUSSERON.

The town is laid out in squares, with twelve lots in a square. In the centre is a square reserved for county buildings. The streets are sixty six feet wide, and the alleys sixteen, running at right angles with the cardinal points of the compass.
