

horned cattle and other animals, which the consternation of the king's troops had prevented their taking with them. The illustrious and ever patriotic city of Cariacos, received us with the greatest demonstrations of joy, and its inhabitants have made a temporary addition to our army of 200 men. This meritorious people hoisted the tri-colored flag as soon as their oppressors left them, and immediately sent a deputation to general Marino. The unhappy inhabitants of Pueblos de San Jose and Casanay, are no longer amongst the mountains they are in tranquil possession of their houses, & enjoy their property, which the Spaniards had deprived them of.—A boatman who passed this night, informs us that several of the enemy who had embarked, have been captured by our cruizers, who guard the coast from Carupano to Santa Fee, and from Barcelona to Cumana. The destruction of the garrison is inevitably cut off at Barcelona, and confined at Cumana by the gen. Piar, it will be forced to surrender. Documents were yesterday found on a courier who was intercepted on his way to Margareta, which states governor Cires had written to gen. Pardo, that he was in want of troops, provisions and military stores. The governor of Cumana demanded of the governor of Pampatar a reinforcement of 200 men, Head Quarters at Cariaco, Sept 20. 1816.

From the Mediterranean.
Boston, Dec. 25.

Capt. Wallace who arrived yesterday, informs, that on the 11th Nov. the U. S. ship Washington, 74, and Constellation frigate, were at Gibraltar, together with a Dutch 74, and 2 frigates.

The American squadron had been at Algiers, from whence it sailed for Malaga, and arrived about the 26th Oct. and in consequence of the severe quarantine regulations departed for Gibraltar. It was understood our difficulties with Algiers had been settled without recourse to arms & peace once more established.—The frigate U. S. was at Port Mahon.

OF SOUTH AMERICA.

Nantucket, (Mass.) Dec. 17.
By the arrival of the brig G. Washington, capt. Myrick, in 18 days from St. Thomas, we have received the following information of the Spanish Revolutionists. Capt. Myrick states that 4 or 5 days previous to his leaving St. Thomas, gen. M'Gregor arrived there from the Spanish Main, bound to Mexico to join the Patriots of that place. Capt. Myrick was several times in company with gen. M'Gregor & learnt that the patriots had totally defeated the Royalists, and obtained possession of all that part of the country. Capt. M. learnt that gen. M'Gregor's reason for leaving the patriots of Lagaira was that he was dissatisfied with their conduct towards mentrals. Gen. M'Gregor appeared in a plain dress.

The projected Meeting to consider the proposition for establishing a Colony of free Blacks took place on Saturday last, in this city, according to public Notice. It was numerous and respectable, and its proceedings fraught with interest. As we propose to publish a report of the whole proceedings as early as practicable, we will only here state, that the hon. Henry Clay having been called to the chair, & Thomas Dougherty, Esq. being appointed Secretary, the business of the Meeting was opened by an address from the chairman, Ellis B. Caldwell, Esq. in a speech of considerable length, developed the views of the friends of this project, and offered several resolutions for appointing a committee to draw up and report a Constitution for the Association, for appointing a committee to present a Memorial to Congress, &c.—which after some remarks from the Hon. John Randolph & Hon. Robert Wright, were unanimously adopted. It is scarcely necessary to add, that all connection of this proposition with the emancipation of slaves, present or future, is explicitly disclaimed. No vested rights of any party are proposed to be in the least affected by it, unless beneficially.

Pennsylvania Legislature. Alteration of the Constitution.

Mr. Powel, on the 9th inst offered the following relative to altering the mode of electing president:

Resolved, that our senators in congress be instructed and our representatives requested, to use their utmost endeavors to have the constitution of the U. States so amended as that the citizens of the U. States shall have the right themselves to elect the president and vice-president of the U. States.

A New State Proposed.

Mr. Lattimore of Mississippi, reported a bill to enable the people of the Western part of the Mississippi Territory to form a constitution and state government, and for the admission of the same into the Union, & also a bill to establish a separate territorial government in the eastern part of the Mississippi Territory; which bills were twice read and committed.
