



# THE WESTERN SUN.

Vincennes, January 18, 1817.

The piece over the signature of 'One of the People,' came to hand too late to appear in our last week's paper—however, we have given him a place in this.

We are authorized to state, that neither Mr. Charles Smith nor James B. McCall, are candidates for the offices to which they have been nominated, nor will they accept of them if elected.

We have been authorized to say, that John Ockeltree, if elected, will serve as a county Commissioner.

Valentine J. Bradley, John D. Hay, and Homer Johnson, are candidates for the office of Recorder.

Agreeably to previous appointment, a number of the citizens of Knox county met at the house of William Bruce, on Saturday the 11th January, 1817 for the purpose of selecting suitable characters to fill the different offices at the ensuing election, to be held on the first Monday in February next, as provided for by the constitution and laws of the state, and whom they wish to have supported.

On motion Daniel McClure, esq. was appointed Chairman, and Wm. Poike, Secretary to the meeting.

On motion the Chairman nominated Samuel McClure, Noah Purcell, Samuel Chambers, Wm. Carruthers, Samuel Thompson, Saml. Dan, Chas. Polke, Wm. Purcell and John Elliott a committee—who after they had retired a short time, returned and made the following report, which was unanimously agreed to by the meeting viz.

Your committee, appointed for that purpose, beg leave to recommend to this meeting and to our fellow citizens throughout the county the following gentlemen as proper characters to fill the different offices annexed to their respective names, viz.—For county Commissioners—George Leech, Charles Smith, and Wm. Bruce—For Associate Judges—Wm. Carruthers & Jas. B. McCall—For Clerk of the Circuit court—Robert Buntin, sen. (provided he will procure a certificate as prescribed by the constitution.)—For Recorder—John D. Hay.—Your committee wish it to be expressly understood however, that they do not presume to dictate or controul their fellow citizens in the choice of officers; but to express their own wishes in a manner guarantee to them by the Constitution and laws of the state.

On motion—Agreed that the Editor of the Western Sun, be requested to give the above one or two insertions in his paper.
