NATIONAL REGISTER.

Mahlon Dickerson (the present governor of New Jersey) is chosen to the Senate of the U. States for six years from the 4th of March next.

PENNSYLVANIA BANKS.

It appears by a document published in the Philadelphia papers, that there are in the state of Pennsylvania, forty eight incorporated, and twenty two unincorporated Banks—making no less than seventy two Banks now in operation in that State.

NEW-ORLEANS, Jan. 14

A report has reached town from the Belize, which augurs much to the cause of Mexican Independence. Gen. Victoria, the patriot commander, in the intendency of Vera Cruz, after having taken a convoy of 200 mules laden with silver from the capitol had marched to Tampico, of which he got possession, without loss; the Royalists saving themselves on board their vessels.—The possession of Tampico will open at once, a channel of supplies of every kind, reaching the patriots in the interior.

In addition to the above it is said that there are a number of those who fled from Tampico, on board a Spanish vessel now in the river.

January 21.

On Friday night the 17th inst capt. Slater who has been long known to the citizens of New-Orleans, as commander of a trading vessel on Lake Poncartrain was, together with his crew, frozen to death on board his vessel, while on the lake. This circumstance will excite the astonishment of our northern fellow-citizens, who generally have incorrect notions respecting the climate of Louisiana.

Jan. 24.

From Vera Cruz.

A gentleman who arrived in the schr. Morgiana, from Vera Cruz confirms the account of the fall of Boquilla. Nautla, a post about 25 miles to the westward of Boquilla, was taken by the patriots.

A hermaphrodite brig was lying at Vera Cruz. From her description she must be the Edward which some months ago, sailed from this port, with a cargo of merchendize for Boquilla, at which place she was taken. The capt. and crew were ashore, assisting in the defence of the place which they did in the most gallant manner, and most of them, with the captain, are said to have been killed. LONDON, Nov. 19.

The price of bread stuffs continue stationary, owing to the allowed importation of grain.

The price of grain has risen so extraordinary at Odessa, that the schetwert of wheat, which last year was at 18 rubles, is at present 41 rubles, a price which was never before known in that country.

The king of Wettemburg, has ordered the purchase of grain in the Baltic for the subsistence of his kingdom.

A letter from Hanover, dated Nov. 4, says, "according to an estimate which has made its appearance, the crop of rye has this year failed in lower Saxony, from one third to one half; the wheat harvest has been less unfavorable barley and oats in most places good, but in the lower grounds bad. Some estimate that there will be a deficiency of 200,000 measures of rye this year for the usual consumption of 200,000 people."

An official paper announces the appointment by the Prince Regent of the duke of Cambridge to be Lieut Governor of Havana.

NEW-YORK, Jan. 31.

A communication from the governor of N. York, calls the early attention of the legislature, to the persons now held in slavery, within the state of N. York. His excellency suggests that a law should be passed fixing a time when slavery should be abolished. The year 1827, is thought by the governor, to be a suitable period.
