By the President of the U.S.

WHEREAS by an act of congress,
passed on the 3d day of March,
1815, entitled 'An act to provide for the
ascertaining and surveying of the bound-
ary lines fixed by the treaty with the
Creek Indians and for other purposes,'
the president of the United States is au-
thorized to cause the lands acquired by
the said treaty to be offered for sale when
surveyed, and whereas the following
townships have been surveyed, in the
District of Alabama, in the Mississippi
territory, to wit:

Townships 11 and 12 in range 13

10, 11 and 12 14

9, 10, 11 and 12 15

9, 10, 12 and 13 16

13, 14, 15, 16 and 17 17

13, 14, 15, 16 and 17 18

13, 14, 15 and 16 19

13, 14, 15 and 16 20

ROE, President of the United States, in
conformity with the said act, do hereby
declare and make known, that public
