4th section of the act laying duties on the

exercise the trade or business of an

person shall have a licence or other spe-
cial authority, continuing in force pur-
suant to the directions of this act on
pain of forfeiting for every such sale at
auction, the sum of four hundred dol-
lars, together with the sums or duties
payable by this act upon the goods,
wares and merchandize so sold: Provi-
ded however, that nothing herein con-
tained, shall be construed to require a
licence for the sale at auction of any
estate, goods, chattels, or other thing,
which by this act are not made liable to
duty or exempted from duty."
