By authority vested in me by the 4th section of the act laying duties on the sales at auction, passed July 24th 1813, and as amended March 24th 1814—I have appointed G. W. Johnston, of Vincennes, auctioneer for the above mentioned counties. "Sec. 2" and be it further enacted—That no person shall exercise the trade or business of an auctioneer, by the selling of any goods wares and merchandize whatsoever by auction, or any other mode of sale, whereby the best or highest bidder is deemed to be the purchaser, unless such person shall have a licence or other special authority continuing in force pursuant to the directions of this act on pain of forfeiting for every such sale at auction, the sum of four hundred dollars, together with the sums or duties payable by this act upon the goods, wares and merchandize so sold: *Provided however*, that nothing herein contained, shall be construed to require a licence for the sale at auction of any estate, goods, chattels, or other thing, which by this act are not made liable to duty or exempted from duty."
