## IMPORTANT.

NEW-YORK, Sept 14.

We have seen a letter from a gentleman at Gibraltar, dated June 21, stating, that the writer had conversed with an officer belonging to the United States ship Peacock, just arrived at that place from Algiers and Tunis. From the latter place they had brought our Consul, Mr. Anderson, who was induced to leave there owing to his having been treated in a manner that would not justify his remaining longer as the representative of the United States—The Bey, for some time previous to his departure, would not permit him to come into his presence, in consequence of his refusing to kiss his highness's hand. He has also detained there an American citizen, for demanding payment for property sold his Highness to the amount of several thousand dollars. The Peacock left them getting their fortifications in order and it is the general opinion that their will be a brush with them, soon after her joining the squadron at Marseilles. She will sail as soon as she can get a supply of provisions and water.

## Latest from South America.

Extract of a letter from St. Thomas to a friend in Philadelphia.

"We have just received very favorable accounts from the Patriots on the main. They are in possession of the whole province of Guayana, & general Paez, after rousing the provinces of Casanare and Socorro in New Grenada advanced to the river Apure at the head of 4000 troops in the province of Carracas. The patriots in Margaritta are now displaying all their patriotic energy against Morillo and his 5000 barbarians. Morillo has recently received an order from the adored Ferdinand to put to death all the inhabitants of the celebrated island whom he may meet with—men, women and children."

MAYSVILLE, Ky. Oct. 3.

On Friday evening last, a boat arrived at this port with 80 passengers from Germany—men, women and children, on their way to the Wabash to join the family of the Harmonites, now at that place. They informed a countryman of theirs in this place, that one of their company (a female not married) is sister to Mr. Robb who is the principal at the Wabash settlement, and who is now at Philadelphia waiting for the arrival of more—about 5000 being expected; these stated that 500 crossed the Ocean when they did. It excited much curiosity, as well as sympathy, to see these strangers in a land of freedom, and a land which heaven has so singularly blest.

Extract of a letter from St. Thomas dated September 2, to a gentleman in the city.

We have accounts here, that Admiral BRION, through the importunities of his officers and subordinates, made a desperate attack on the royalists of Augustura,

which terminated in the entire defeat of the latter, and the reduction of the whole province of Guiana to the control of the patriots. A part of the land and sea force of the royalists surrendered, and the surviving remnant of the army escaped to Grenada.—BRION has proceeded for Margaritta, with the intention it is said to dispossess the royalists of that island.

No further particulars of the expedition have reached here; but letters have been received containing the amount of what is above stated."

Captain TAYLOR arrived at New-York in 23 days from Tobago, brings information that a Spanish schooner had entered that port from Augustura, wit advices that the royalists had been completely defeated at the latter place—Eighteen vessels in all had escaped passengers, six of which had passed Tobago.—The above mentioned schooner had on board one hundred and fifty passengers, royalists, who had made their escape at the time of the reduction of the place.—*Patriot*
