

Items of News.

THE FLORIDAS.

Information derived from a very respectable source and on which we are satisfied to rely induces us to believe that the Floridas in less than six months will be under the government of the United States.—We will at least hazard a conjecture, that a treaty between Spain and the United States will be submitted to the senate, in the early part of the next session of Congress, for their consideration, ceding that province to this government. If this should be the case and the price fixed upon be five millions, we think the nation will be satisfied particularly if that sum be carried to the credit side of the account against Spain for violations of our commerce.

In a small tree in the garden of Mr. Samuel Warburton, of Suffolk, a wren, a linnet, and a blackbird have all built their respective nests. These little musical tenants of the tree live in perfect harmony together, and according to the fashion of the times, pay their rent to Mr W. in notes.

The Paris Papers lately mentioned the execution of a young man at Lyons, charged as a principal in the recent seditious practices in that city.—The following particulars respecting him are given in the Bath Herald.

From late German papers it appears that the Hessian government has discovered an effectual mode to prevent emigration. Seventy persons, who had sold their property with intent to go to America have been stopped at the frontier, conducted to a vessel, and confined in the House of Correction. It must be a weak government (says a London paper) that conceives this the way to reconcile its subjects to their native home.

We understand (says the Boston Palladium) the Spanish Consul has submitted his claim to the property brot on shore from the Industria prize ship in behalf of the owner, she is said to have gone into Portland and will be also claimed;

INTERESTING YORK.

We are informed by a western correspondent, that Col. Baldwin passed Charleston on the Kenawha, the 23d September, having surveyed and examined James and Jackson's rivers, from Beale's Bridge to the mouth of Dunlap's creek, the intermediate country between that point, and the great falls in Kanawha river; and was continuing the survey and examination of the last mentioned river, to its confluence with the Ohio.

Our informant adds that Col Baldwin is decidedly of opinion, the rivers which he has surveyed, are not only susceptible of navigation but may be rendered safe and easy for boats of considerable burden, at much less expence than he had expected: and that a road may be constructed from the mouth of Dunlap's creek, to the falls of Kanawha, forming angle not exceeding five degrees with the horizon, at moderate expence for a work of that character; as the materials are abundant and very convenient. Emigration.—The approach of cold weather seems to rouse those who intend to exchange this for a warmer climate. The Springfield Federalist of Thursday last mentions that 145 souls passed through that town last week for the western country, and that the present week 18 or 20 waggons, laden with men, women, and children had followed them on Thursday 16 waggons passed through Haverhill on their way to the State of Indiana. We understand (says this Patriot) that they contained 120 men, woman and children, principally from Durham in the District of Maine, accompanied by the minister of the town, whose object is to purchase & settle a towns hip of land in that state. It is also ascertained that within the last thirteen days, no less than seventy three waggons, containing an average of six souls each, have passed thro' this town on their way to the West.

Earthquake.—A great shock of an earthquake was felt in this town on Sunday about ten minutes before 12 o'clock. The vibration continued about 15 seconds but we do not learn it did any damage.—The Boston Gazette men-

tions that the shock was so severe in that place as to occasion several of the inhabitants to leave their dwellings: and that in the vicinity, particularly at Cambridgeport, the meeting-house was shook in a tremulous manner, as to cause it to be immediately deserted by the whole congregation; at Woburn many of the walls were thrown down and it is feared considerable injury was done.
