## RUSSIA.

Late accounts says the emperor Alexander was on the eve of leaving St. Petersburg, for 18 months on a tour of inspection through the southern provinces of his immense dominions.

The differences between the Turks & Russians are likely to be amicably settled and a negotiation is said to be on foot for engaging the sublime porte to permit the free passage of the Dardanelles to all vessels paying a moderate duty.

St. Petersburg, July 31.

An event which took place on the 21, of last month, in the environs of Abol, has created great alarm among the inhabitants. On that day, towards noon the ground of a village, 22 versts from the city suddenly sunk to the depth of many fathoms, and dragged with it 12 houses, which were completely submerged (preserving however their situation) so that no trace of them could be discovered. A similar falling in of the earth occurred in the same place in 1755 and '88. Among other causes, this phenomenon is ascribed to the swampy marsh upon which the village is built, and to the river which flows through it.—The accident has occasioned great loss to the inhabitants.

## FRANCE.

Lyons.—Accounts by the way of England, represent this city to be in a state of insurrection, "equalling in atrocity & violence the most sanguinary scenes of the revolution" and that Marshal Marmont had been appointed to the command of the 19th military division, of which Lyons was to be his head quarters.

## FROM IRELAND.

NEW-YORK, Nov. 1.

We learn of capt. Gould in 30 days from Dublin, that notwithstanding the wet weather which had prevailed a considerable time the crops in Ireland had proved abundant.

A considerable sensation prevailed in Dublin, in consequence of a communication from the Chancellor of the Exchequer, stating that the wants of government were such that it would be impossible to relinquish the window tax, without substituting a house tax for an equivalent, which the citizens have stated their inability to pay. At the time capt. G. sailed, placards were placed in every direction of the city, calling upon the citizens to hold meetings and adopt measures for resisting this odious impost; which when laid on was done with an express provision that it should continue no longer than the war.

## LORD COCHRANE.

It is stated in the Louisiana Gazette of September 27th that reports were in circulation in N. Orleans of Lord Cochrane's arrival off Apalachicola with a frigate and other armed vessels. It is said that his Lordship meditates an attack on Pensacola.

The following remarks from an English paper on our country, places it in a situation which must ever be gratifying for Americans to behold.

"All the travellers whom we have ever read express their astonishment of the respect which every American manifests for the laws of his country—in the most remote and wild situations no one thinks of offering resistance to the laws, any more than he would do in one of their most crowded cities. However far party zeal and even party rage may be carried on in that free country, partisans of all parties always respect the laws. What a contrast with the south of Europe, where, under the most absolute governments the lawless violence every where prevails; where injustice is practised with impunity, because there is no judge whom bribery cannot gain over. What a contrast with our own sister kingdom, Ireland, where in many parts the laws are set at open defiance. If they go on in this manner, giving the name of anarchy to a most signal obedience to the laws, they will soon endear that name to the world."
