

Whereupon, the speaker appointed Messrs. Sullivan, Stevens, Ferguson, Daniel and Hunt the committee on the part of the House of Representatives.

A joint resolution from the senate, on the subject of the proposed amendments to the Constitution, was read, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

The Speaker laid before the House the report of the Auditor of State—Also, the report of the Treasurer of State, which were read, and ordered to be referred to the committee of Ways and Means.

On motion of Mr. Sullivan.

Ordered, That a committee be appointed to bring in a bill requiring the Secretary of State to procure from the Land Offices at Vincennes, Jeffersonville and Cincinnati, a list of lands subject to taxation within this state; and Messrs. Sullivan, Stevens, Boon, Cotton and Scott were appointed that committee.

Mr. Sullivan, from the committee appointed to bring in a bill requiring the Secretary to obtain a list of taxable lands reported a bill: which was read, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

TUESDAY, Dec. 9.

Mr. Stevens introduced a bill providing for township officers, which was read and ordered to be read a second time on Saturday next.

Wednesday, Dec. 10.

Mr. Stevens from the committee, on the subject of public roads and highways, reported a bill, which was read, and ordered to be read a second time, on next Thursday week.

Mr. Graham from the committee to whom was referred the relief of sheriffs, reported a bill which was read, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

The bill, directing the mode of changing the venue was read the third time & passed.

On motion of Mr. Cotton, Resolved that a committee be appointed to bring in a bill respecting the leasing of sections No. 6, and Messrs. Cotton, Carr, Dunn, Bryson, Snowden and Holman were appointed the committee.

Mr. Slaughter from the committee on that part of the governor's Message relative to a state Library, reported that they were of opinion, that it be postponed for the present.

Thursday, Dec. 11.

Mr. Graham moved, that the letter referred to in the governor's communication and his excellency's answer thereto on the subject of slaves escaping into this state be spread on the journal, and on the question being taken, it was determined in the affirmative.

AYES—Messrs. Boon, Bryson, Buntin, Carr, Campbell, Cotton, Conner, Dunn, Daniel, Grayham, Hill, Holman, Little, Lynn, Scott, Snowden, Stevens, Slaughter, Sullivan, Zenor, and Lane, (Speaker,)—22.

NAY—Messrs. Chambers, Ferguson, Littell, and Milroy—5.

Mr. Boon introduced a bill, making a specific appropriation for Wolf scalps, which was read, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

Mr. Stevens from the committee appointed on that subject, brought in a bill to organize the associate judges into a county court, which was read, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

Mr. Ferguson from the committee on that subject reported a bill for the relief of insolvent debtors, which was read, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

Mr. Slaughter introduced a joint resolution on the subject of the medical society; which was read and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

Friday, December 12.

Mr. Ferguson introduced a bill regulating ferries, which was read, and ordered to be read a second time on Monday next.

Mr. Stephens from the committee of revision, introduced a bill providing for surveyors—Also a bill against forcible entry and detainer;—Also a bill concerning clerks;—Also a bill, regulating proceedings on indictments;—Also, a bill establishing a county treasury; which were read and ordered to a second reading.

The bill, regulating the emigration of negroes and mulattoes into this state was read the second time when Mr. Hunt moved that the further consideration of said bill be indefinitely postponed, which was decided in the negative.

On motion of Mr. Ferguson,

Resolved, That a committee be ap-

pointed to bring in a bill for the benefit of occupying claimants to lands; and Messrs. Ferguson, Carr, Buntin, McClure and Beggs were appointed that committee.

Mr. Sullivan presented the petition of Charles Smith and others of the Steam Mill Company near Vincennes, praying an act to authorize the executors of John Johnson decd. to sell and convey certain property; which was read and referred.

## Senate.

SATURDAY, Dec. 6.

Mr. Ferris presented a bill to provide for carrying the laws into effect in new counties; was read and ordered to be read a second time on Monday next.

Mr. Ferris, from the committee on that part of the Governor's Message relative to the revision of the laws, reported, that a joint committee, consisting of three from the Senate and five from the House of Representatives be appointed, &c. which report was concurred in by the Senate; and Messrs. Paul, Polke, and Ferris were appointed that committee on the part of the Senate.

The reports of the Auditor and Treasurer of State, were received and read.

On motion of Mr. Depauw, the joint resolution, relative to the amendment to the Constitution of the United States, was read a third time, and passed.

On motion of Mr. Pennington, the Senate resolved to re-consider their vote of the 3d inst. relative to granting leave to bring in a bill to repeal an act, entitled "an act prohibiting non resident attorneys from practising within this state."

TUESDAY, December 9.

Mr. Paul presented a bill, relative to non resident attorneys and counsellors at law; which was read, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

The Secretary of the Senate reported that he had appointed Jonathan Dotey, assistant secretary; who was sworn and entered on the duties of his office.

On motion of Mr. Depauw, that a committee be appointed to examine and correct the journal, and deliver them to the state printer; and Messrs. Depauw, Pennington and Beggs were appointed that committee.

Wednesday, December 10.

Mr. Polk from the joint committee of revision, reported a bill for granting writs of *ne exeat*, and regulating proceedings thereon.

—A bill establishing the office, and defining the duties of Notary Publics; which were read and ordered to be read the second time to-morrow.

Mr. Pennington introduced a bill relative to application for new counties, and for other purposes, which was read, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

The Senate proceeded to the consideration of the nomination of Isaac Blackford, Esq. as one of the Judges of the Supreme court and on the question being put, it was decided unanimously in the affirmative.

Thursday, Dec. 11.

Mr. Paul from the joint committee of revision, reported a bill regulating the fees of certain officers.—Also a bill subjecting real and personal estates to executions, for debts which were read, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

The bill respecting non resident attorneys, was read the third time, and on the question shall this bill pass? It was decided in the affirmative.

AYES—Messrs. Baird, Conner, Ferris, Grass, Polke, Pennington and Paul.—7.

NAYS—Messrs. Beggs, Dupaw, and Montgomery.—3.

Friday, December 12.

Mr. Pennington introduced a bill for fixing the seats of Justice in new counties, which was read, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

Mr. Paul, from the joint committee of revision, reported a bill to provide for the partition of real estate—Also, a bill regulating estrays—Also, a bill prescribing the mode of proceeding against absconding debtors; which were read and ordered to a second reading on several different days.

Leaving in the hands of the treasurer on the 29th Nov. last provided that the warrants audited as aforesaid have been paid at the treasury, \$3,820 76  
Since the 29th Nov. last it is estimated that the receipts into the treasury for the years 1814, 1815 & 1816 amount to 905 04 1/2  
And for the year 1817 1,078 33 1/2

Making a sum total \$3,833 37 1/2

Amount due and unpaid by sundry sheriffs, exclusive of their commission for the year 1817, and exclusive of sundry balances due the sheriff under the late territorial government, \$6,578 29

And from the counties of Clark, Gibson, Washington and Switzerland, no duplicates having been received for the present year, no estimate can therefore be made of revenue that may be derived thence.

On the bond executed by several citizens of Harrison county for one thousand dollars suit has been instituted which when recovered will add 1,000 00

There are however demands which will shortly accrue in favor of the officers of the judiciary estimated at 1,500 00  
And to meet interest arising on loans, 1,200 00

Exclusive of such monies as may be required to liquidate the remaining outstanding debts under the head of territorial warrants.
