Generals Jackson and Scott.

New and Important Invention.

A PATENT has been obtained by John Evans from the United States for an improvement on the WATER WHEEL, of which the following is a schedule.

The wheel is hollow, and the buckets hanging by joints or hinges to the outer edge, so as to fold with the current into the wheel against arms for that purpose, and to open again when the water acts upon the contrary side of the buckets, and the buckets thence proceed up stream, with the joint or hinge end foremost to, when it folds again into the wheel: the arms that receive the loose ends of the buckets, is continued by arms and joints to the block or rings that fit round the shaft which is to stop the wheel must be moved up the shaft to loose the buckets, which will then swing loose in the current.

The invention has been tried by a model, and the patentee, has now a mill nearly ready to be put into operation, in Davis county, Indiana, that can be seen.
