BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE

UNITED STATES.

Whereas by several acts of Con-
gress, the President of the United
States is authorised to cause to be of-
fered for sale the public lands in Illi-
nois:

Therefore, I, James Monroe, Pres-
ident of the United States, do hereby
declare and make known, that there
will be offered at public sale, at
Shawneetown in the Illinois Territo-
ry, the following townships and frac-
tional townships, north of the base
line, viz:

On the first Monday of December
next,

Townships 1 to 4, in range 1 E. of
the 3d principal meridian.

Townships 1 to 6 in range 2, do.
1 to 7, do. 2, do.
1 to 7, do. 4, do.

On the first Monday of February
next,

Townships 1 to 7, in ranges 5, and 6
E. of the 3d principal meridian.

Townships 2 to 7, in range 7, E.
3 to 5, do. 8, do.

On the first Monday of April next,
Townships 1 to 5 in ranges 9, 10, and
11, E. of the 3d principal meridian.

Townships 1 to 4, in range 14, W. of
the 2d principal Meridian.

Townships 2 to 7, in range 13, do.
5 to 7, in range 12, do.

Except such lands as have been
or shall be reserved by law for the
schools or for other purposes, the
lands shall be offered in regular nu-
merical order, commencing with the
lowest number of section, township,
and range; and each sale shall con-
tinue three weeks and no longer.
