BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES.

Whereas, by several acts of Congress, the President of the United States is authorised to cause to be offered for sale the public lands in Illinois:

Therefore, I, James Monroe, President of the United States, do hereby declare and make known, that there will be offered at public sale, at Shawneetown in the Illinois Territory, the following townships and fractional townships, north of the base line, viz:

On the first Monday of December next,

Townships 1 to 4, in range 1 E. of

the 3d principal meridian.

Townships 1 to 6 in range 2, do.

1 to 7, do. 3, do.

1 to 7, do. 4, do.

On the first Monday of February next,

Townships 1 to 7, in ranges 5, and 6

E. of the 3d principal meridian.

Townships 2 to 7, in range 7, E.

3 to 5, do. 8, do.

On the first Monday of April next,

Townships 1 to 5, in ranges 9, 10, and

11, E. of the 3d principal meri-

dian.

Townships 1 to 4, in range 14, W. of

the 2d principal Meridian.

Townships 2 to 7, in range 13, do

5 to 7, in range 12, do.

Except such lands as have been,

or shall be reserved by law for the

schools or for other purposes, the

lands shall be offered in regular nu-

merical order, commencing with the

lowest number of section, township,

and range; and each sale shall con-

tinue three weeks and no longer.
