

them denotes national energy, elasticity, and reform. Patriotism, talent, knowledge, experience, are shown to be all in full and salutary motion.—The system of ecclesiastical discipline and administration is under revision, subjected to various beneficial changes. Royal decrees abound, tending to the regeneration of every branch of government and economy, particularly the finances. The most remarkable of these decrees is one of the 24th of April, which ordains, that, for the purpose of giving the people a knowledge of their rights and duties, and in order that they may be enlightened on these from the very sources whence they had been too often deceived, all the parochial curates of the monarchy shall explain to their parishioners, at stated hours on the Sundays and holidays, the political constitution of the Cortes; pointing out its utility to all classes, and refuting all accusations against it; that the same shall be done for the children of the primary schools, by their teachers; for the students in the universities and ecclesiastical seminaries, by the regular professors of the law and of moral philosophy; and for the inhabitants of convents, and universally of all literary and monastic establishments, by their principals. The decree also directs, that the constitution be stereotyped at the Royal Printing Offices, to make a copy of it attainable for every one; and that it be printed and distributed in all the trans-marine dominions of Spain. Another decree establishes an anniversary commemoration, with the utmost military and ecclesiastical pomp, of the death of those Spaniards whom Murat butchered in Madrid on the second of May, 1808; another prescribes and regulates the organization of the National Militia "to guard the constitution;" and it appears that numerous volunteer companies are forming themselves for the same object.

The Barcelona Diary complains of the distorted news respecting Spanish affairs, given in the French gazettes. It traces them to malice chiefly, and in part to ignorance of the Spanish language. It contradicts the rumors of revolutionary movements in Portugal, and the assertion of the British ministerial journals, (upon whose tone it animadverted sharply,) that the South American Provinces will not receive the constitution. It alleges that the best results are expected in South America, when the intelligence of the revolution is received there.—It relates that Ferdinand expostulated with the French Ambassador at Madrid, in regard to the calumnies vented in the French ultra-royalist and ministerial journals, against the Spanish revolution, and that he assured his excellency that he, Ferdinand, was the first and the heartiest constitutionalist of Spain. Much good pleasantries and keen sarcasm are indulged in the Spanish papers about the fears of the Prussian, French, and British governments, as to the influence of Spanish example, and the infection of Spanish liberty. The French journalists are fully matched in point of ability, and over matched in the topics of recrimination, and in poignancy of satire. The whole number of French troops in the neighborhood of the Pyrenees, is stated at 3700, and represented as "a cordon against freedom." Patriotic pieces are constantly performed on the Spanish theatre; a new one entitled "Liberty Restored," was announced for the 2d of May, at Barcelona.

Some of the particular traits mentioned in the Diary, are full of meaning, and well worthy of being repeated. When Canga Arguelles, the new Minister of Finance, who had come from the fortress of Ceuta, appeared for the first time before Ferdinand, the latter would not allow him to kneel, but embraced him; asked his pardon for the ill he had done him; professed the utmost sorrow for his suffering; exhorted him to maintain the constitution, and to rely on his support; and, finally, both burst into tears.

After Arco Aguerro, one of the heroes of the army of the Isle of Leon, had been carried in triumph by the people of Madrid, he repaired to the Royal palace his crown of laurel at the feet of the "Constitutional King."

Don Augustin Arguelles, appointed Minister of Justice, being in very bad health, on his return from imprisonment at Majorca, was obliged to stop at Almenara, a village distant seven leagues from Valencia. The principal members of the Catalonia regiment, in that city, repaired to the number of twenty four, to Almenara, and brought the distinguished patriot on their shoulders in a litter to Valencia. How different this in spirit and effect from the harnessing the populace in Manchester, to drag the radical demagogues!

NEW YORK, June 18.

FROM THE SPANISH MAINE.

We learn the following by the brig General Brown, which left Porto Cabello 30th ult.

The expedition from Margareta still had possession of Rio de la Hache, but the royalists were in strong force in their neighborhood, and cutting off the Patriots daily.—The conspiracy to take the life of Gen. Morillo and his principal followers, discovered at Valencia, originated with the Creoles. The governor of Valencia, and six others, suspected of being engaged in the conspiracy, had been shot, and a number more, were yet to suffer.

Cumana and Barcelona, remained in quiet possession of the Royalists.

It was said two divisions of Spanish troops, had marched against Santa Fe.

Gen. Bolivar was said to be at Achaguas, with a new supply of men and money. Gen. Paez with his division, was at San Fernando.

Morillo's head quarters were at Valencia—Morales was at Calabozo.

From the Boston Palladium, June 16. EXECUTION.

Yesterday the sentence of death which was lately passed by the Circuit Court of the United States, against William Holmes, Edward Rosewaine, and Thomas Warrington, alias Thomas Warren Fawcett for the crimes of piracy and murder on board a Prize schooner under the Patriot flag—was executed in this town in the presence of a large concourse of spectators.

The vessel, on board which these crimes were committed, arrived many months since at Scituate within this District, soon after they were perpetrated, and the culprits were arrested, brought to trial before the Circuit Court, and convicted. On being brought up to receive sentence, they moved an arrest of judgment, predicated on a doubt of the jurisdiction of the court; whereupon the case was carried up to the Supreme Court at Washington; when, after the question was ably argued, the objections were over-ruled, and the convicts received sentence at the present term of the Circuit Court.

The criminals were taken from prison by the Marshal, at 10 o'clock, A. M. and conducted to the place assigned for their execution, which was nearly on the spot where Powers lately suffered. They passed through State and India streets, by Central wharf in view of the shipping, and thence by the Custom-house to and through the southerly Main street.

A gentleman who left Gibraltar on the 17th ult. informs us that news was received there that day of Mr. Forsyth's return to Madrid, from a short visit to France.

A terrible accident occurred at the Circus in Cadiz on the 3d, of May, at a Bull Fight, given for the benefit of the soldiers of Quiroga's army. A wall of the Amphitheatre, on the side appropriated to the lower order of the spectators, suddenly gave way, and fell, killing and wounding several hundred persons. *New York, paper.*

By a law passed at the last session of Congress, foreign armed vessels will be prohibited, after the first day of July, from entering any of our harbors, those of Portland, Boston, New London, New York, Philadelphia, Norfolk, Smithville, N. C. Charleston and Mobile excepted, unless when forced in by distress, by dangers of the sea, or when pursued by an enemy.

INTELLIGENCE FROM RUSSIA.

Moscow, lately visited by our Minister, Mr. Campbell, still continues to be the metropolis of that mighty empire.—Though consigned to the flames in 1812, as is said there by the orders of their own government, when visited by Bonaparte, it is now, by the extraordinary efforts of the Emperor, aided by the inhabitants, nearly rebuilt, and has resumed, in a great degree, its former splendid and magnificent appearance. The churches estimated at nearly two thousand, with their lofty spires glittering in the horizon—that of the Kremlin rising majestically above the rest, most powerfully arrest and astonish the beholder. Among the public institutions, the *Caesarean Society of Inquiry into Nature*, is highly distinguished. Its principal director is the eminent Cotta-Rischer, a gentleman of the first character for his attainments both in literature and science. His excellency the Minister, and our fellow citizens, Dr. Mitchell, were elected members at the same sitting. The emperor Alexander manifest on all occasions, the friendly sentiments he entertains towards the United States. He is, in a great degree, his own foreign minister, and,

by his industry and system, transacts a world of business himself.
