Revolutions are the order of the day in Europe, and not an arrival now but brings us something interesting from that quarter. The Revolution in Portugal announced to-day, is not calculated to excite surprise. The wonder rather is, that during the voluntary exile of the Royal Family, the People have so long submitted quietly to the authority of a Court held in another quarter of the globe. We regret that, owing to the News having reached Philadelphia on Sunday, we have not more satisfactory accounts of it. With regard to the reported Conspiracy in France, though it is somewhat singular that our first advices of it should be received by the way of Spain, the passage of the vessel has been so short as to bring Paris dates several days later than we had previously received by the usual channels. The news, therefore, if not true to the extent stated, is probably not without foundation. *Nat. Int.*

By information, direct from an officer in the service of the South American Patriots, under Bolivar, lately arrived at Baltimore from the Spanish Maine, it appears that Mr. THOMAS MONTGOMERY, formerly of Dumfries, Va. was inhumanly murdered by the royal Spaniards, while on his way from the fleet, with dispatches for the Columbian Government in Venezuela. *Wash. LONDON, AUG. 12.

It is confidently asserted in Paris, that one of the objects of last audience which Prince Esterhazy, the Austrian Ambassador to our Court, had with his Majesty, was to make known to the King of England that the five years imprisonment of Bonaparte, agreed on in 1815, having expired, Austria will no longer be a party to his detention, and would no longer send out a Commissioner, in which sentiments Russia concurred. *Globe.*

The making of roads and canals, by which the different parts of this continent are in a manner wedlocked to each other, has an important moral influence far beyond any local or geographical advantages. It not only serves to be the means of transporting all the productions of all the varieties of this climate, to and from the place where interest points their destination, but likewise, it draws us together by cords of adamant. Local, subordinate, selfish interest is thus preserved in maintaining the integrity of our government. Add as many new states as we please to the American confederacy, yet, if it is for the interest of the individuals composing those states, to barter and exchange their productions: if self-interest, interests the strongest of all ties, predominates; if, in other words, an internal commerce may be carried on to advantage, by the making of roads and canals, there is, there can be, no fear of our political separation. Every new road, every new canal, facilitates such intercourse; and it may in some sort be regarded as a prodigy, that here both patriotism and self-interest pull one way. *Balt. Chron.*

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 11.

Spain.—We have received some Madrid gazettes, and a complete file from the first of March down to the middle of July. We have also a complete official list of the Cortes.

It is with sincere pleasure that we announce to all those who feel a just interest in the honor of our country, that the minister of state of the Spanish government, on the 20th June last, officially communicated to our minister, Mr. Foran at Madrid, the information that Ferdinand VII had approved, in the most ample form of the liquidation made by the council Junta, which he had appointed to examine and report upon the claims of Mr. Meade; declaring that the nation was bound to pay the full amount verified by the commissioners to be due, together with interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, agreeable to the award till the whole amount be discharged.

This intelligence would seem to indicate a disposition to pursue a policy towards the U. States different from that which has governed the court of Madrid

for many years—and that in all probability the new government may recognize the claims of all our fellow-citizens, and lead to the ratification of the treaty which makes provision for the payment of claims.
